PACKS BIG

Proposals call for new school, more acreage **BY NANCI THEORET**

Barron Collier Companies continues to meet the evolving needs of a growing town with construction of the first phase of the Anthem Parkway extension to a new elementary school opening in 2025 and a proposal adding 1,000 acres to Ave Maria's developmental footprint. The road project will improve access to the town's eastern fringes and provide a bypass around the busy Town Center, while the additional land will expand the town's total acreage to 5,000, allowing for an increase of homes from 11,000 to 12,000

and condensing development in eastern Collier County.

David Genson, president of development for Barron Collier, expects construction of the first 1,500 feet of the Anthem Parkway extension to begin this quarter to accommodate anticipated site



development later this year for the new developer-built Collier County public elementary school. Scheduling road and school construction while accommodating Pulte Homes' expansion of its Avalon Park neighborhood pushed back the original timeline.

"It took a lot of coordination to make sure there was proper access for the elementary school as well as a future middle school," says Mr. Genson, noting the elementary school will open for the 2025-2026 school year. Ave Maria has well over 500 children in Collier County Public Schools, he adds.

The 1.5-mile Anthem Parkway extension will eventually connect with Pope John Paul II Boulevard. It will have traffic-calming roundabouts and 12.5-foot-wide paths for pedestrians, golf carts, and bicyclists.

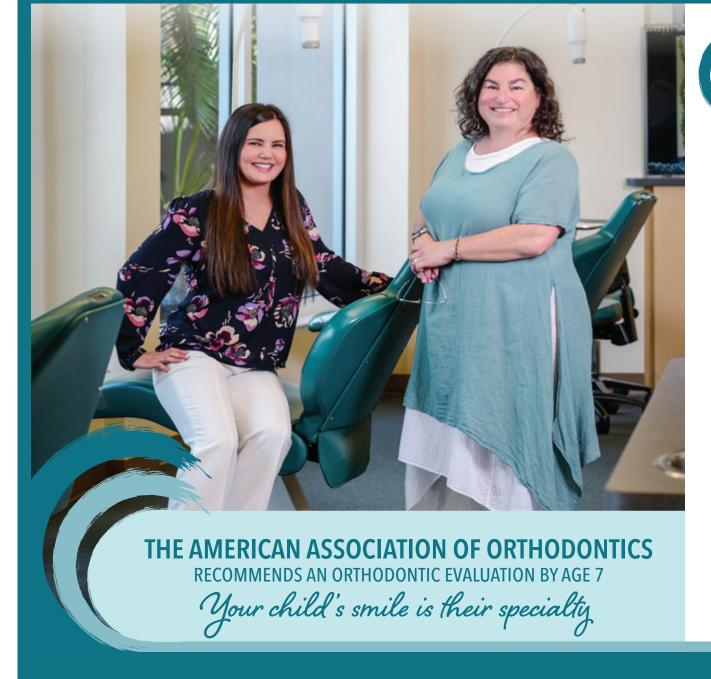
It was standing room only when the grand opening ceremony and community open house took place for the brand-new Immokalee Fire Control District Ave Maria Public Safety Complex that's home for Fire Station 32 along with EMS personnel and law enforcement from the Collier County Sheriff's Office. The headquarters at 5362 Useppa Drive will also serve as an emergency operations center as needed.

Mr. Ribali describes Top Notch Connections as "a community of entrepreneurs and small business owners who are driven to grow our businesses, challenge the status quo, and innovate how networking and business development is done."

Top Notch Connections also includes Top Notch University, a program that teaches business owners practices to improve and sustain their businesses.

"Our mission for Top Notch University is to help entrepreneurs get the education they need to take their business to the next level,"

Mr. Ribali says.

The Ribalis' latest project is Biz Kidz, an extension of Top Notch University designed to support and assist the next generation of entrepreneurs.

Mr. Ribali says he hopes the Biz Kidz organization provides the same support to the area's young entrepreneurs that he received as a youngster. "Our mission is to educate kids who have that entrepreneurial spirit," he says. "I tell the kids at our expos how I got into it: My mom had cucumbers in her garden, and I took those cucumbers and sold them door to door. I knew I had the entrepreneurial spirit from a young age, and my mom realized it, too. She always encouraged me to get out there, find business ideas, and sell my products.

"That's what we want to do for today's kids," he adds. "We want to show them there are other ways to make an income, other ways to launch a business. And we want to be there to help them realize what potential they have."

Biz Kidz recruits local business owners through Top Notch Connections to serve as mentors and judges and to sponsor prizes for teams that present their business projects.

The first Biz Kidz Expo was held in Naples this past April. The second took place at Oil Well Craft Beer in Ave Maria in May. More than 25 local businesses sponsored the event that brought together kids ages 7-17 to show off their original products and services. Judges assessed 12 team projects on 30 aspects, including overall business plan, marketing strategy, and sales numbers.

The Ave Maria Kidz Biz Expo drew more than 175 attendees, and some booths reported more than \$100 in sales. A team of six girls from Eden Park Elementary School won the grand prize for their jewelry business called Dazzle. Second place went to Israel Gallegos for his Big Boy's Peanut Butter Treats, and third place went to Scholastica Niewald, a sophomore at the Donahue Academy, for her Ave Creations line of original artwork.

The Ribalis are planning more Biz Kidz Expos in Fort Myers, Naples, and Immokalee. They also look forward to growing their community of Southwest Florida small business owners through Top Notch Connections and using the Top Notch community to encourage the spirit of entrepreneurship in future generations.



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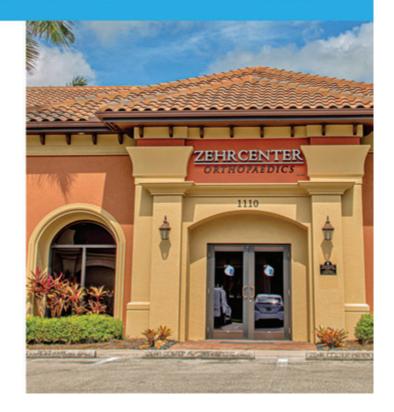
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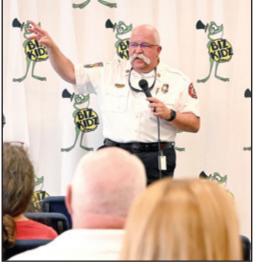

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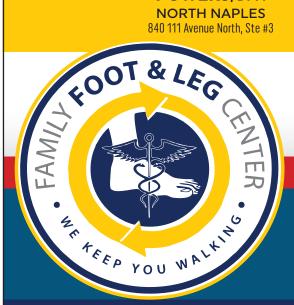
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MEET A TOWNMAKER:

Thomas Peek keeps a close eye on Ave Maria's infrastructure

As chairman of the five-member board of supervisors for the Ave Maria Stewardship Community District (AMSCD), Thomas Peek has played an essential administrative role in the development and maintenance of infrastructure at Ave Maria since 2004, when the district was first created. You can see him in action every month at the public AMSCD meetings in the Town Center.

"These special-purpose districts signed into law by the Florida legislature permit the people who live within them to have a higher level of development — more landscaping, for instance — than they might have on a typical county street, and to sustain those elements at a level over and above what the norm might be if the county were responsible for maintenance," Mr. Peek explains, adding that the AMSCD owns those streets and issues tax-exempt bonds to pay for them. Every year, every Ave Maria homeowner is charged an equal (non-ad-valorem) assessment to cover maintenance expenses and pay down those bonds.

Mr. Peek is friendly, relaxed, curious, and keenly interested in looking after the Ave Maria streets, landscaping and other structures that come under the AMSCD. He also happens to be well-qualified to oversee the district after a long and successful career, first as the engineer for Collier County from 1968-1973 and later as a name partner of Wilson, Miller, Barton and Peek (WMBP), the engineering firm of choice for many Southwest Florida developments, with offices in Naples, Fort Myers, Sarasota, and Tampa.

"There's been a tremendous amount of land development in this area, and we had projects up and down the Florida coast, including Lely Resort, Naples Bath and Tennis Club, Wyndemere, Bonita Bay, and Quail Creek," Mr. Peek says about his days at the engineering firm. "We did all of the land surveying, roadway design, and roadway work, designed the drainage systems, things like that."

He designed the first piece of road in Pelican Bay in Naples, and 20 years later was in charge of the last one. "I kind of lived through the entire development," he says.

After retiring from WMBP in 1998, Mr. Peek was invited by Barron Collier Companies to join the AMSCD board of supervisors. He was more than happy to do it.

"It takes time and work and understanding to keep the business of the district moving forward, but I've enjoyed being on the board. I enjoy keeping up with how the town is growing," he says.

new community come up out of a farm field, and to see the Town Center, the church, and the university being built. And now to see all of the development that's going on with new housing and the golf courses ... I get excited about things like that."

Mr. Peek says all five members of the board of supervisors "have a sincere desire to make Ave Maria what the developers originally intended: a super-nice place to live and raise a family. And all of us as supervisors are fully committed to see that it continues to be accomplished, to keep the place maintained to the level that people have come to expect."

At the age of 82, Mr. Peek leads an active life shared with his wife Nora, a civil engineer. The couple met when both were attending engineering school at the University of Tennessee. They've been married for 58 years.

The Peeks both try to live by the saying, "Live ready," Mr. Peek says.

"You don't know when it's going to be your time to be standing there facing the maker, so you better live ready. Be kind to people. Help those that are in need. And just live the way God and Jesus are teaching us to do."

They have two accomplished daughters and three college-bound granddaughters. The younger daughter is a senior manager at a large engineering firm in Houston. "Our older daughter is the rebel, because she didn't become an engineer," Mr. Peek quips, adding she was an elementary school teacher until she became busy raising three daughters.

There are quite a few engineers in the family.

"It's not just me, Nora, and our daughter," he says. "I have a brother-in-law who's an engineer. Nora's two brothers are engineers, and her father was also an engineer. So, you can understand what the topic of conversation around the dinner table is when the family gathers together. Sometimes it gets kind of technical," he chuckles.

For Mr. Peek, engineering is a source of joy. "I like to see things being built. I like to see the results that come from designing a new community — the streets and houses, and then the families that start living there."

Other forms of engineering also fascinate him, he says. "The space program is absolutely spellbinding."

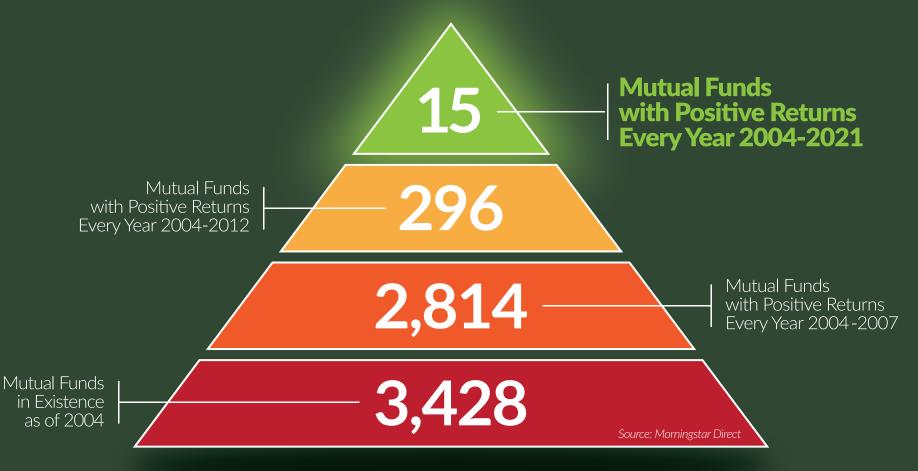
But perhaps most exciting of all, Mr. Peek's passion for golf came to a jaw-dropping crescendo when he recently hit two holes-in-one during the same round of golf. "The odds for that happening are like 67 million to one," he exclaims. "All I could do was stand there, look, and laugh."

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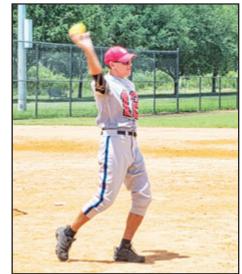

Athletic facility projects underway at Ave Maria University

DEC Contracting Group is completing work on three athletic facilities to enhance student athlete performance and recreational opportunities at Ave Maria University.

The largest project involves demolishing Tom Golisano Field House, a 40,000-square-foot pre-engineered metal building with a stucco exterior, down to its structural steel. It will be rebuilt with new roofing, HVAC, electrical and plumbing fixtures, and DEC Contracting Group will add locker rooms, a new playing surface, and staff offices. The Field House is home to Ave Maria's men's basketball, women's basketball and volleyball teams, as well as the sports medicine and strength and conditioning programs.

Across the street and adjacent to Gyrene Field, DEC Contracting Group is constructing the 5,440-square-foot pre-engineered Quonset Locker Facility, a military hangar-inspired structure that will include locker rooms,

sports programs.

The third project is Judi's Gym, a pre-engineered, 12,320-square-foot pavilion that includes three covered basketball courts, which also will be lined for volleyball and pickleball. It will include electricity to provide lighting for evening activities and 83 parking spaces. The facility will be used for recreational sports and will be available for Ave Maria students and local residents.

"Ave Maria University moved from Michigan to Florida in 2007 and it quickly established a reputation for its solid academic programs and variety of intercollegiate sports," says DEC Contracting Group CEO Regina Dunn. "The university's investment in these facilities is an investment in the student athletes who represent the institution. Once completed, Ave Maria University's athletic facilities will rival those of the top institutions in the Sun Conference."

"After 15 years of steady growth, Ave Maria

University is entering the next phase in its development, and it's exciting to have a role in building a campus for the future," adds DEC Contracting Group President Douglas Masch II. "The university has gone from a blank canvas in an old tomato field to a thriving campus that draws students from across the country. Construction is underway on all three projects, which will be completed in phases from this fall through next spring. 🤽

With 12 lighted pickleball courts — "more than any other community I know of in Southwest Florida," Mr. Graeve says — plus two tennis courts, four bocce courts, a separate three-lane lap pool, a jetted spa and the 8,000-square-foot tropical pool with umbrellas and illuminated fountain bubblers in its beach entry.

At Del Webb Naples, it's never a question of what to do, but what to do next. In addition to a nearby community garden and a tiered amphitheater carved into a grassy area near the pool, Del Webb Naples also offers optional membership at the Gordon Lewis-designed Panther Run Golf Course (fresh off bunker and turf upgrades) with a pro shop and private lessons on-site.

Then there's the dizzying year-round social calendar of clubs, events, art classes and activities in not one but two clubhouses. Grand Hall and the Oasis Club boast more than 30,000 combined square feet and offer a fitness center, movement studio, activity and art rooms, a card and game room, catering kitchen, café, library, grand ballroom for community-wide

events, and the Rusty Putter Bar & Grill. With views of Panther Run's signature finishing hole and aqua range, the Rusty Putter is a popular spot offering a lounge and lunch and dinner menus.

"Del Webb Naples is a little city within itself," says Shirley Jerezano, general sales manager for Pulte's Southwest Florida division. "Our amenities are up and running. Usually when you buy into a new community you have to wait for amenities. Our residents are always busy, and that's what makes Del Webb Naples a big destination for buyers."

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Summer brings new beginnings to Ave Maria Water Park

The Ave Maria Water Park is in upgrade mode these days with the installation of trees and shrubs to beautify the amenities, new swimming lessons and water exercise classes, a revamped concession stand now dubbed the Cannonball Café, and a fresh approach to customer care by recently appointed Operations Director Kellie Powell. Amidst these improvements, fun continues to take center stage with planned parties and everyday poolside merriment all summer long.

A 30-year veteran of the aquatics industry, Ms. Powell has a passion for keeping everyone



safe around the water. "With three kids growing up in Saint Petersburg surrounded by water, my mother saw the dangers of living in Florida and made sure that all of us were water rats," she says. "She knew the statistics are very high for children who drown

from the ages of 2 to 15, and she was determined that her children wouldn't be one of them.

"We had a home pool, my sister was a junior lifeguard by age 12, and I grew up as a competitive swimmer and springboard diver."

Ms. Powell married a YMCA aquatic director and has worked in nine different YMCAs as either a certified swim instructor or aquatic director.

Given her robust aquatics background, it's easy to see why bringing swimming lessons to Ave Maria for children as young as 6 months is her No. 1 priority.

Comprised of eight classes, the park's American Red Cross Learn-to-Swim program empowers youngsters with swimming skills and safety principles using catchy rhymes that are easy to remember. Think: "Reach or throw, don't go," an important tutorial about how to stay safe while rescuing a friend who is struggling in the pool, and "Too much sun is no fun," a prompt about the importance of UV protection and proper hydration.

Water exercise and more

For anyone over the age of 13, the new water exercise program offers a balanced workout by alternating between cardio and muscle-strengthening routines four to five days a week, depending on the season.

"Anyone can participate, whether they're a swimmer or non-swimmer," Ms. Powell stresses. "We teach in chest-deep water, and we don't go under.

"For people with all kinds of body issues — the water is the best place to exercise because the buoyancy helps to hold you, so you can work out to the best of your ability and at your own pace. The faster you work in the water, the harder and more challenging your

workout is.'

Ms. Powell is training her staff to become certified swim instructors and inspiring the park's lifeguards to be mindful, observant, and proactive when safeguarding the people enjoying the amenities.

"My biggest challenge so far has been getting my lifeguards to blow their whistles at the kids who are running," she says with a chuckle. "I'm trying to instill in my staff that it's our job to keep everybody safe.We're not trying to be bossy or mean, but it's always safety first, and then fun follows."

In addition to everyday fun, the water park will host three events for Ave Maria residents this summer: the July Fourth celebration from 11 a.m.-2 p.m., and the Back-to-School Bash from 11 a.m.-2 p.m. Saturday, Aug. 13. Both family-friendly events will include a variety of games and competitions in the water, on the pool decks, down the waterslides, and at

the volleyball court. Participation is free with admission to the park.

On Monday, Sept. 5, the park's adults-only Labor Day Luau is set from 6-9 p.m., complete with food and musical entertainment. Cost is \$25 per person.

The Cannonball Café

With an expanding menu that includes popcorn chicken, French fries, hamburgers and pizza, along with tried-and-true favorites like hotdogs, snow cones and ice cream. The Cannonball Café is under new management by the same Ave Maria family that owns Oil Well Craft Beer and The Secret Ingredient: Danee and Matt Williams, along with their

kids, Ave Maria University student Peyton, 20 and Reese, 18. The entire family is excited to add value to the water park experience.

The park offers several pavilions that can be rented for birthday parties, family reunions and other celebrations.

"For \$160 you get four hours, one of the pavilions, and admission for 25 guests," Ms. Powell says. Patrons are permitted to bring coolers with their own food and non-alcoholic beverages (no glass containers).

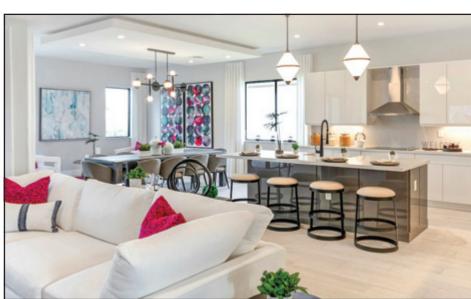

Barron Collier Companies is also petitioning local and state lawmakers to amend the boundaries of the Ave Maria Stewardship Community District to incorporate 1,000 acres of land recently purchased on Camp Keais Road to the east. Comprised of a developer- and publicly elected board of supervisors, the stewardship district was the first in Florida, approved by Collier County commissioners to address smart growth and established in 2004 by a special act of the Florida Legislature to provide core infrastructure like roads and water management to support the developing community.

"We had the opportunity to buy land to the east at a reasonable price," Mr. Genson says. "We see a lot of growth potential and it makes more sense to bring the acreage into Ave Maria, which will condense development in eastern Collier."

The extra acreage would also include additional amenities, parks, and retail and commercial development, says Mr. Genson.

The amendment will be presented during the 2023 legislative session and, if approved, take effect in July 2023. 3

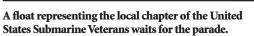

benefits of living in Ave Maria and move to the town, it will help ensure prompt response to calls and provide other community services for all residents to enjoy.

The main 22,000-square-foot building has three bays that can hold six vehicles, including the ladder truck, medic unit, brushfire unit, and water tender. One wing has offices and a meeting/training room. The other wing provides living quarters for four firefighters and two medics who are available 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

The support services captain works out of the 5,400-square-foot logistics building in the back of the complex. This building also houses the reserve fire engine (for use when the main engine is out for maintenance), hurricane and brushfire materials, and supplies such as hoses, boots, helmets, gloves, and air packs.

Energy-efficient elements such as light sensors and low-flow water were used in the construction, as well as smart technology to control features through an iPad.

The station is the first new facility in the Immokalee Fire Control District, which covers 234 square miles in Collier County, since its inception in 1953.

Funding for the \$10 million complex came from impact fees, not taxes.

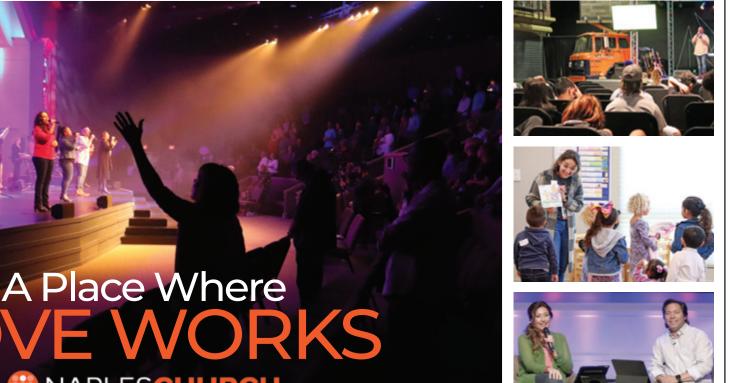

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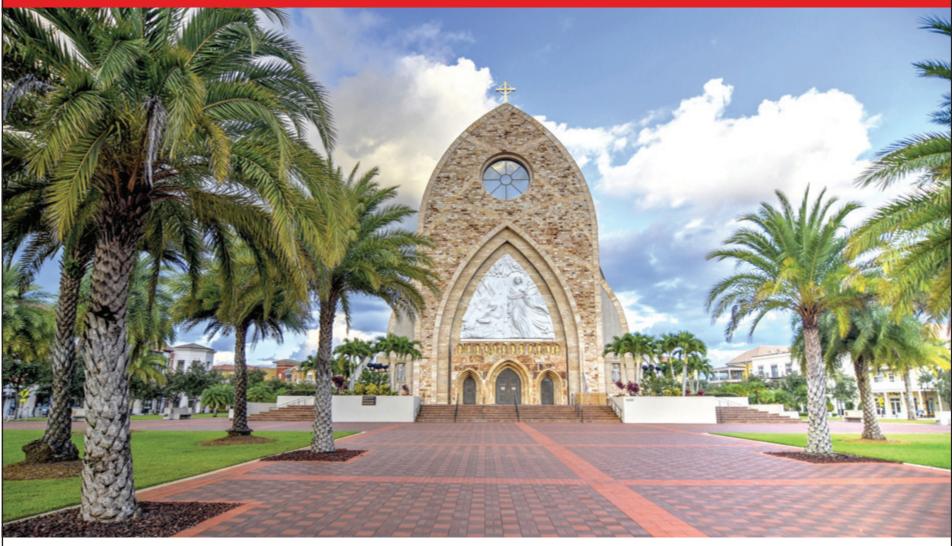
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
