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# Medical clinic opens, game store has new owners

Raul Enad, M.D., FACP, opened Cadenza Medical Clinic in December 2022 after moving here last summer. He was traveling from Miami to Fort Myers for a job interview but stopped by Ave Maria on the way and was charmed by the friendliness of the people. He says it was a "natural draw" to move to the town and open a medical clinic after 30 years of clinical experience.

Dr. Enad shares his own story of developing arrhythmia (irregular heartbeat), chest pains, lightheadedness and vision problems from stress. He turned to functional medicine, a form of alternative medicine that examines everything from a patient's nutritional intake to their sleep habits, to help him understand the root causes of his problems and take steps to improve his health. Now he practices functional medicine, offering his patients micronutrient, food allergy, hormone and cardiac inflammatory marker testing, among others.

"Health cannot be accomplished just by taking medications," he says. "I talk about diet, exercise and meditation."

His staff includes Carolina Diaz, an esthetician and phlebotomist, who also helps with the medical spa aspect of the practice for treatments such as micronee-

dling, Botox and Restylane. Dr. Enad is a proponent of regenerative medicine and developed a skincare serum with vitamin C



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# Meet a Townmaker: Fire Chief Michael Choate still loves having "the greatest job on the planet"

When Fire Chief Michael Choate was just a boy, if you asked him what he wanted to be when he grew up, he would say a fireman, just like his father. Born and raised in central Florida, he graduated Hardee County High School with a mission to take every course and earn every state certification that would allow him to ride that shiny red ladder truck.

Mr. Choate reminisces about the start of his career: "As a young firefighter in my 20s, I remember the thrill of sitting in the back of that truck, riding backward on my way to a fire or vehicle accident, running lights and sirens, busting through intersections and cars moving out of our way, thinking to myself, "This is the greatest job on the planet. I can't believe I get a paycheck for this."

He spent more than two decades at Hardee County Fire Rescue, where he was promoted through the ranks, ultimately serving as fire chief and public safety director for 10 years. Since 2016, he has been the district manager and fire chief of the Immokalee Fire Control District (IFCD), overseeing two fire stations in Immokalee and one in Ave Maria, which officially opened last June with one fully staffed fire truck and a medic unit. In 2022, they fielded 4,800 total calls; 1,031 (or 21.4%) came from Ave Maria. The IFCD is an independent taxing district, with five elected fire commissioners to whom Chief Choate reports.

"I'm the big-picture guy," he explains. "I have to maintain the 1,000-foot view, so to speak. I'm responsible for the financial solvency of this place, for maintaining morale among our staff and for ensuring our readiness. Every single truck and every firefight-

er has to be ready for an all-hazards type response.

"I also have to be a good steward of tax dollars. The fire commissioners are there to make sure I don't spend money without it being justified, because it's taxpayer dollars. I think over the time I've been here, I've proven that I have the citizens we serve forefront in my mind, and I make sure that we have everything we need to provide the very best possible service."

Chief Choate believes fire and rescue is all

about customer service. A can-do attitude and politeness are paramount.

"I make sure our people are customer servants. Period. End of story," he says. "People call us on their absolute worst day, and the end user doesn't want excuses. They don't care why it took us an extra minute or two to get to them, and rightfully so. They don't care if we came from another call and had to drive across town to get to their address, or if we were tied up and a unit from another zone had to come in. All they care about is that

they need help right now."

He explains that because of federal exemptions for charities and others, 50% of the taxable properties and individuals in the IFCD don't pay taxes, which means the district is fully funded by the remaining 50% that do pay taxes. "We simply don't have the tax revenue yet to build second and third staffed units out here," he says. "But all of that will come in time as our population here in Ave Maria continues to grow and more tax dollars roll in."

Chief Choate's vast experience, exuberant speaking style and clarity of purpose cause people to look up to him, but he is quick to direct all accolades to the men and women who save lives and protect property every day.

"I used to be possessive when I was a young fire chief. It was me me —my guys, my department, my battalion chief," he says,. "But I don't do that anymore. I've learned that this is not at all about me. It's about the firefighters. They make me look good by doing their jobs, because what I hear when I walk into meetings

is, 'Hey chief, I saw your guys in this vehicle accident yesterday. They were just clicking, tools were flying, roofs were coming off of cars and patients were being pulled out, and those guys didn't even say 10 words to each other. They just knew what they were doing. You can tell they were ready for it.' That's the positive stuff I hear so much out of our community, and I'm just so proud to call myself their leader."

Chief Choate and his wife, Linda, live in Avalon Park. They raised four sons in rural Wauchula, enjoying cows, a fishing pond and regular hunting trips. When the couple first moved to Ave Maria, they experienced a bit of a culture shock, but they've come to love the lifestyle here where everything is a golf cart ride away.

Three of their sons are in their 20s. Keith and Cole followed in their father's footsteps and joined the fire service, while Clay, 31, chose a different profession. Last September the family lost Kyle (Keith's twin brother) in an accident. He was 23, had recently completed the emergency medical technician academy and was about to begin the fire academy.

"The setback of losing a child has been unbearable. It's an endless nightmare," the chief says. "I've been out of focus, and I have to pay full credit to my deputy chief of operations who has assumed his role plus mine for months and months now. I'm slowly starting to refocus."

Fire Station 32 in Ave Maria also serves as the IFCD headquarters. Chief Choate invites residents to stop by any time to tour the facilities. "It doesn't matter what day of the week it is. If our ladder truck is sitting in the bays, that means our firefighters are here, and any one of them would be happy to show them around."

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# He's back: Original Donahue Academy teacher steps into the principal's office

Marc Snyder and his wife, Cynthia, were among Ave Maria's initial homebuyers and the first two teachers hired for Rhodora I. Donahue Academy when it opened in 2007.

After several years teaching at the academy, Dr. Snyder further pursued his own education, earning a master's degree in educational leadership and administration, and later a doctor of education in higher education, from Nova Southeastern University in Fort Lauderdale. It was no surprise when he sought a larger role at the academy.

Dan Guernsey, the principal who hired Dr. Snyder, encouraged his faculty member to leave Donahue and gain more leadership experience elsewhere. He even put Dr. Snyder in touch with a man who was starting a school in Spain, where the Snyders eventually moved in 2013. For two years, Dr. Snyder served as the school's principal, while Mrs. Snyder taught kindergarten.

The couple returned stateside in 2015 for Dr. Snyder to serve as principal of True North Classical Academy that was opening in Miami, gaining him more experience.

It was a circuitous route, but solid career guidance has brought Dr. Snyder full circle. After serving as vice principal of Donahue Academy this past school year, he has replaced Dr. Guernsey as principal.

"I'm excited to be taking on this position and feel extremely humbled and blessed to be appointed," Dr. Snyder says. "It's a place that I love dearly."

He grew up in Philadelphia, doing well academically and participating on the wrestling and volleyball teams in high school. He earned a bachelor's degree in microbiology from Florida Atlantic University with ideas of

attending med school but felt a calling to the priesthood, so he studied at a Denver-based seminary for three years.

He ultimately came back to Florida and taught middle school science in Plantation for three years and then at a Catholic high school

for one year.

"I loved that Donahue was a Catholic classic school," Dr. Snyder says about his first position as a teacher at the academy back in 2007. "You don't find that combination very often. It's the best of both worlds." He

and his wife stayed there until 2013. Coming back nine years later as vice principal, Dr. Snyder found the school's mission and vision remained the same, but the community had changed.

"Ave Maria has matured as a town," he notes. "It's grown up in terms of the number of houses and people and different kinds of businesses. There was a point when the town first opened that you would go to a store and always see someone you knew. Now, I'm always meeting someone new."

Donahue Academy had about 200 students the first time the Snyders taught there; the most recent academic year had 362 students, and the 2023-24 year will start with 420 students. Four new classrooms were recently completed, and modular classrooms are anticipated in 2024-25 to allow for doubling K-5 attendance from 180 to 360.

"We have 200 students currently on a wait list and feel a moral imperative to grow the school," Dr. Snyder says. They plan to launch a capital campaign to build a new wing, perhaps in 2028.

The school is adding boys' baseball and girls' softball next year and is thinking about golf. Academically, Dr. Snyder says he wants Donahue Academy "to become the best Catholic classical school in the nation. I really want Donahue to be the beacon that other Catholic classical schools turn to as the model."

It took leaving Donahue Academy and Ave Maria for Dr. Snyder to find this job, but he savs it was worth it.

"I really thank Dr. Guernsey for encouraging me to spread my wings and go outside Ave Maria to gain various experiences and leadership skills," he says. "There is no doubt in my mind that I moved forward as a leader and am in a position fully capable of leading Donahue Academy through its next phase." \*\*

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# AMU football star driven to give back to the town of Ave Maria

The town of Ave Maria has been very good to Savohn Hunt, and he's been good to it in return.

Mr. Hunt played high school football and initially signed on to play at Morehead State University, but they didn't offer him a full scholarship. Then his high school coach, Joe Patterson, became head coach at Ave Maria University (AMU) and helped Mr. Hunt secure the funding he needed for his college education.

Having played four years in the AMU football program, Mr. Hunt was a two-year team captain and earned All-American honors following his senior season in 2019. He graduated in 2020 with a degree in exercise physiology, after having been named the university's "Mr. Ave," an honor given to the student who best embodies AMU's culture.

He had plans to play professional football as part of an indoor league when the pandemic sidelined that idea. He thought of a better one.

"I came to the conclusion that I wanted to marry my wife a lot more than I wanted to play football," he said. "I wanted to build a career where I could provide for her and a family."

He reached out to Coach Patterson, who offered Mr. Hunt a student support advisor position. Mr. Hunt also became a resident director, living in a dorm with his wife, Emily, and son Tyson, who was born in December.

Because the couple wanted Mrs. Hunt to be a stay-at-home mom, Mr. Hunt began thinking of ways to earn more money.

In June 2022, he decided to offer rides to and from area airports. It was another good idea.

"I posted it on Facebook and within a day was hit up about rides," he says. "People said it's a great service that we need. It caught fire."

By that September, Ave Rides was an official business that employed AMU students looking to earn some extra cash with a job offering flexible hours.

"I was bombarded with so many requests to do rides, but I still had to work two other jobs," Mr. Hunt says. "I was unable to do all the rides, so I found people I knew and trusted who went to the university." He even lent them his car if they didn't have one.

Ave Rides booked more than 500 rides in its first 10 months and now has about 20 drivers. Most customers are traveling to or from Southwest Florida International Airport (RSW) in Fort Myers, but drivers also take people to Fort Lauderdale, Miami and Punta Gorda. Trips to Seminole Casino Immokalee or for dinner in Naples are also popular. The company also agreed for a trip to the Orlando International Airport once.

"We're happy to solve a big need," Mr. Hunt says.

Even though Ave Rides "caught lightning in a bottle," he says, he wanted to find a way to manage the financial highs and lows of season. So, he launched Ave Rides Auto Spa, a mobile detailing business, in March. Three levels of service start with wash, wax and tire shine and can include interi-

or vacuuming, seat cleaning, leather conditioning, deodorizing and bug protection.

"It's going well so far," he says. "We offer the same premier, reliable service that Ave

Rides has." He adds the idea for the mobile detailing sprang from all the rides he and his employees give. "Who knows better how to keep a car clean than someone who has to do it 24/7," he says.

Mr. Hunt also joined forces with some young adults who were providing this service as a side business, so he

combines their skills with his marketing and built-in customer base.

Ave Rides Auto Spa travels to Naples, Fort Myers, Bonita Springs and Estero to work on

Starting new businesses comes easy to Mr. Hunt. He was 10 when he opened a business cutting lawns. In high school, he developed a business cleaning and reselling sneakers on eBay and Facebook.

"If you ask any other entrepreneur, you start one business, you want to start another. It's addicting."

He also likes how his businesses help connect members of the town with AMU students. "The clients love to hear how the students ended up here and what they're studying. And the students get to network with the people in our community."

It's a town that has meant much to Mr.

"I'm so glad I get to live here," he says. "I went to school here, got married here, started a family here and work here. I'm happy to give back to a place that has given me so much."

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



and entertainment. Hometown Christmas is the ultimate kid nirvana, bringing pint-sized carnival rides, a parade and Santa Claus to the town.

Come summer, most activities shift to outdoor venues and the water park's robust schedule. The park features slides, splashing buckets, an activity play area, sand and pool volleyball and a toddler pool. With a new aquatics director, Ave Maria is amping up swimming lessons this summer with the goal of building a swim league as children progress.

"The water park is our saving grace during the summer," says resident Jessica Lowden, a mother of three. "We could go every day."

The Lowden family also enjoys bingo nights at Oil Well Craft Beer and regularly attends AMMA's First Friday events that bring face-painting, balloon artists, music and more fun to the Town Center lawn in the cooler months of the year.

"Ave Maria does so many events that are kid-friendly," Mrs. Lowden says.

The AMMA also coordinates occasional field trips for miniature golf, bowling and excursions to nearby wildlife centers like the Kowiachobee Animal Preserve for educational encounters with tigers, bears and gators. Parents provide transportation.

"As lifestyle director, my job is to fill in all the areas and create things for residents to do close to home," says Mrs. DiFlorio. "As the community grows, we will have more options for people to get together and do things right here in the town."

#### The scene for teens

Teens are tops in Ave Maria, and several clubs and groups offer programs for this often-hard-to-please age. AMMA's newly formed Teen Council introduced a teens-only version of "The Amazing Race" scavenger hunt and is hosting a June 24 murder mystery dance and planning teen-led story times for children at the waterpark.

The lifestyle director for the neighborhood association in Maple Ridge gives teens their

"I have a knack for it," she says. "And I will toot my own horn: All in all, the students I've tutored are in the top of their grade. I'm so proud of them."

Ms. Muenz rewards children with pennies (10 for a good lesson) and a happy dance when they master a multisyllabic word. She's tutored in Ave Maria for two years and has a waiting list for her 90-minute sessions.

# Making way for fun and games

Colleen and Jason Phelps, the new owners of Way Out Toys & Games in the Town Center, believe it truly does take a village. With a new arcade double its previous size, including

five pinball machines (a novel concept to the town's youngsters), plus the addition of a TV and a snack table, the Phelps offer a haven for kids to hang out safely while parents run errands in the Town Center.

"A lot of kids ride their bikes here after school, play and hang out until mom wants them back for dinner," Mrs. Phelps says. "We see the store and arcade as a comfortable throwback, like when their parents were kids and had a place where everyone knew them. We want to give kids that feeling of a little bit of freedom and a place of their own."

Way Out Toys & Games also offers the popular Pokémon Pack Wars every Tuesday night. Participants pay \$20 for three packs of cards and compete in lightning-fast rounds with winners determined by the highest-scoring numbers in their decks. Winners receive an assortment of Pokémon prizes. The Phelps also hope to offer birthday party packages, day camp events and parents' nights out, the latter giving parents a few hours for dinner at local restaurants while their kids are entertained at the game store.

"Baseball gets them out of the house and exercising," she says. "They love it. It's a great chance to meet other kids in the community. For me, it's been a way to meet other parents." The boys' sister, 15-year-old Bailey, often cheers on her brothers and is active in high school drama and chorus.

Ariel Hernandez, an Ave Maria parent and information officer for Ave Maria Little League, says the program has grown considerably since its 2008 charter, now fielding eight teams with Tee-ball programs for ages 4-7, girls' softball for ages 7-12 and baseball for boys ages 7-14. Last year's 9- to 11-year-old boys' team won the spring 2022 District 18 championship.

Mrs. Hernandez says she has witnessed her son's transformation since joining the league. Now 9, he's been playing for 2½ years, has expanded his circle of friends beyond those who attend his school and benefited from the discipline and mental challenges of the game.

"I have Little League to thank for that," says Mrs. Hernandez, who's also happy to have met other parents through baseball. "It's been tremendous for our family. The teams are also really involved in Hometown Christmas and major parades in the Town Center."

#### Dance, camp and Biz Kidz

For the past 14 years, Karen Ledesma's Ave Maria Dance Academy has shifted to summer camp mode, transforming into Camp Ave Maria, a recreational camp for school-age children 6 to 12. Full- and half-day sessions are limited to 30 kids and start the Monday

"It's good old-fashioned fun," Mrs. Ledesma says. "We do indoor and outdoor sports and games, Minute to Win It games, bingo, talent shows, relay races, scavenger hunts, arts and crafts. We have a lot of fun! Sometimes I don't know who's having more fun, me or the kide"

For Ave Maria's youngest entrepreneurs, Biz Kidz Expo and Biz Kidz Market give them the opportunity to learn the fundamentals of business. So far, the programs designed and run by Ave Maria resident JD Ribali have inspired and encouraged kids to make and sell everything from dog leashes and custom jewelry to baked goods and refurbished robotic toys.

"Our goal is to support kids and spark young entrepreneurs to make and sell their products and services," Mr. Ribali says. We even celebrate failures and talk about ways to make something better."

# Dive into summer at the Ave Maria Water Park

Few summer pastimes compare to the sunny delights at the Ave Maria Water Park, with fitness and recreational swimming options, super-fun water slides, interactive fountains, a play area for little ones and plenty of seating for resort-style relaxation.

And the beloved outdoor funhouse is upping its game. Serving Latin American delights and traditional park food, the brand-new CJ's Water Park Café is getting rave reviews. Pavilion rentals and food packages from CJ's are now available for birthday bashes or summer parties for up to 50 of your closest friends.

Serving fitness and fun to residents of all ages, the park's summer lineup includes three distinct programs. The new Summer Progressive Swim Team offers instruction by experienced coaches to turn 6- to 16-year-olds into capable, competitive swimmers. For youngsters 12 and under who haven't yet dipped their toes in the water, Red Cross-certified swimming lessons will have them confidently and safely splashing around in just eight lessons. And for adults (13 and over) looking for a great workout, the park's water exercise classes will get them into tip-top shape.

#### CJ's Water Park Café

By all accounts, CJ's Water Park Café is a runaway hit. Co-owners Cristina and Juan Rosado have drawn from their Puerto Rican heritage to build a menu brimming with Latin American flair and flavor. Their mainstay is the pastelillos, "little pastries" filled with a choice of seasoned ground beef, marinated chicken breast, mouthwatering melted cheese or sautéed shrimp. For dessert, try the pastelitos, a pastry filled with sweetened guava and cream cheese.

"We add a lot of cultural stuff, such as sofrito, which is the base of all Latin cooking," Mr. Rosado explains. "It's a mixture of peppers, onions, olive oil, cilantro and other Latin spices that you cook the filling in first." The pastelillos, he adds, are always made fresh to order. "We want you to see, hear and smell the food. When it touches your lips,

it's nice and hot and the flavors attack your tongue. We love our food. We have taken a long time to develop a great recipe, and it is fantastic."

Side dishes at CJ's include sweet plantains, fried green plantains sprinkled with garlic salt, rice and beans, and chicharrones (salted, fried, pork belly). Also on the menu are park favorites including burgers, hot dogs, pizza, breaded chicken strips and French fries, as well as sodas, ice teas, juices, ice cream, icees and other desserts like flan. The café is open 11 a.m.-5 p.m. seven days a week.

The Rosados have added innovations to streamline ordering, such as a separate line to expedite drink orders, plus QR codes and an online interface so people can order from anywhere in the park, instead of standing in line. Curbside takeout orders are also in the works. Check out https://cjs-pastelillos.square.site to see the full menu.

#### **Poolside parties**

Throughout the summer, the park's shaded pavilions that can be rented for birthday parties, family reunions and other celebrations. The \$160 cost includes a four-hour pavilion rental plus park admission for 25 guests. Up to 50 guests can be accommodated for additional charges.

While patrons can bring coolers with their own food and non-alcoholic beverages, food

packages can now be pre-ordered from CJ's Water Park Café seven days in advance for gatherings at the park. Packages can be as simple as two pizzas, two liters of sodas and a tower of ice cream cones or can involve more elaborate offerings such as chicken with rice and beans and sweet plantains. Birthday cake options are also available. Call Juan Rosado at 516-782-9093 to customize your food and beverage orders, depending on the number of invited guests, the nature of the party and whether it is primarily for adults or children.

#### Summer Progressive Swim Team

For kids ages 6-16 who already know how to swim the front crawl and back stroke, the Summer Progressive Swim Team runs through Aug. 3, making a splash starting at 8 a.m. Monday-Thursday. Three certified coaches will teach the butterfly and breast-stroke as well as underwater turns to develop competition-ready swimmers.

"They'll be doing everything correctly so that they won't injure themselves or be disqualified during a swim meet for doing an illegal kick or an illegal stroke," says Kellie Powell, the park's operations director. "We're training future swim competitors." She hopes that by next season the team will become a USA swimming club, with members going to competitive meets with other clubs and entities like the YMCA. Plus, she adds, the team is a great way for kids to be involved in an outdoor sport and develop self-esteem.

The cost is \$65 per month, and participants need to sign up in person.

# American Red Cross swimming lessons

Last summer, Elizabeth Lavandera brought her son Antonio to the water park for swimming lessons. Just 3 years old at that time, he was afraid of the water, and it took one whole lesson for him to even enter the pool. But after just eight lessons with Ms. Powell, Antonio was triumphantly swimming without wearing any floating devices.

"I believe this is Miss Kellie's calling — to teach kids swimming," Mrs. Lavandera says.

"I thank her every time I see her. We were committed to having Antonio learn to be confident in the water so that if something would ever happen, he would know how to float up and find safety." By the time he was in his second week of lessons, Antonio was able to face his fears, thanks to the trust Ms. Powell had earned.

"I remember telling him, 'You are so brave!' And he looked at me and said, 'Mommy, I can't believe I swim," Mrs. Lavandera says.

Now, the duo regularly visits the park to swim together in the big-person's pool.

Through August, swimming lessons are available for water babies (6 months-3 years old), preschoolers (3-5 years) and youth (6-12 year). Classes are led by American Red Cross-certified water safety instructors. The cost is \$65 per student for eight lessons. Weekday morning and weekend classes are available. Families must register in person.

# Fitness laps and water exercise classes

Tommi Black and her husband Richard Allen are in their 70s, and they come to the water park at least five times a week to swim laps and enjoy the sun.

"We love the water park," Ms. Black says. "For 40 cents a day on a quarterly pass, it's the ultimate bargain. The water park is clean, the chairs are always organized, the equipment is always available and there's a great schedule of classes. It's terrific." The couple completes about 30 laps per visit for exercise.

"There's a certain Zen that comes over me when I swim," Ms. Black says. "I find a lot of peace and serenity doing it."

For a full workout, the park offers water exercise classes alternating between cardio and muscle-strengthening routines for Ave Maria residents ages 13 and up. Classes are from 9-10 a.m. Monday-Thursday and also Saturday. All necessary equipment is provided, including resistance gloves, noodles, pool buoys and barbells. The cost is \$65 for 20 classes or \$5 per class.

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
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






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


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
