

Co-Ed Softball Team

Every Sunday morning, a group of about a dozen to possibly two dozen Ave Maria residents convene in South Park for casual, lively games of slow-pitch softball.

The gatherings are delightfully informal; in fact, the group doesn't even have an official name. Yet, what they lack in formality, they make up for in sheer enjoyment.

Warm-ups begin around 9:30 a.m. and the first pitch is about 10:00 a.m. The games have no umpires, and a four-run limit per inning is imposed to maintain balance and prevent runaway victories. Modifications to the rules are made when insufficient players turn up, ensuring everyone gets a chance to participate.

For example, a right-handed batter may be allowed to hit only to left field. Or if there aren't enough players for four infielders, outs may be recorded simply by catching the ball before the runner reaches first base.

The players do not have uniforms, but jerseys have been ordered. They will say Ave Maria on the front and players can choose a name and number for the back.

The games attract a diverse crowd, from former collegiate athletes to senior citizens and even children, fostering a sense of inclusivity and community spirit. Although labeled as co-ed softball, the majority of players are male, spanning ages from their 20s to their 70s.

Ave Maria resident Justin Chervets is a regular. Although only one woman played the morning the Sun stopped by, he said



Marking Achievements at Ave Maria University's Commencement Day

The Ave Maria University (AMU) commencement on May 4 at the new Golisano Field House celebrated the achievements of 277 graduating students, awarding 251 bachelor's degrees, 24 master's degrees and two doctorates. Nearly half of the graduates were originally from Florida. The others came from 36 states and five countries, including Aruba, Canada, France, Germany and Spain. Women represented 57% of the class.

"One interesting anecdote that is worth mentioning is that this class entered in the fall of 2020 in the height of COVID-19 uncertainty, so they showed a lot of courage in leaving their homes and coming from around the country and around the world to come to school here, and have shown an enormous amount of perseverance getting to this day," said Provost Roger Nutt, who holds a doctorate in theology and is responsible for academic programming at the university.

In a heartwarming homecoming, Nicholas Healy, the school's first president from 1999 to 2011, received an honorary degree in recognition of his foundational commitment to the university that continues to this day. Mr. Healy and his wife Jane, who have been married for 60 years, spend their winters in Ave Maria.

Delivering an inspiring commencement speech, Father Mike Schmitz also received an honorary degree. He is the director of the Youth and Young Adult

Ministry for the Diocese of Duluth, chaplain for the Newman Center at the University of Minnesota-Duluth, and the widely popular podcaster of "Bible in a Year" and "The Catechism in a Year," produced by Ascension.

Eleven students completed their master's degrees in business administration. It is the largest MBA class in AMU's history, underscoring a noteworthy trend.



"The number of MBA graduates were in the ones and twos a couple of years ago, and by next fall when we reconvene, there will be nearly 50 students in the program, so the popularity of that program is really accelerating. We see exponential growth in future years already," Nutt remarked.

Another significant showing was in

health- and science-related studies, including exercise physiology, health science, nursing, biology and biochemistry. "There's a strong healthcare and pre-med culture on the campus," explained Nutt. "Nursing is very strong, but four of the top 10 or 11 majors at the university are in the biology department."

Philosophy and theology have always been core strengths at the university, and this year is no different, with 12 and 19 bachelor's degrees, respectively, as well as 13 master's degrees in theology and two doctorates in philosophy. Regardless of their major, every AMU student must fulfill a core curriculum that includes three theology and three philosophy classes.

According to Nutt, "For the committed student who knows that they want to be an entrepreneur or a doctor or a lawyer or a nurse, Ave Maria University has become a very attractive place." All students must also complete courses in literature, math and languages, with an emphasis on writing skills and the ability to communicate effectively. The idea is to help AMU students become well-rounded individuals able to confront

an ever-changing world and job market. "It's tempting for schools today to

be hyper-specialized such that three or three-and-a-half of the four years are taken up by courses directly related to the major, but we find that the blend between the liberal arts foundation and the spe-

"At some schools, you can be challenged somewhat academically, but the unique thing about Ave Maria University is that the students are challenged simultaneously to pursue human and professional excellence while also being challenged to grow spiritually and make it their own."

"The blend between students in science, business and pre-professional programs like nursing and elementary education, and then the traditional humanities like theology and philosophy, shows the maturation of Ave Maria University as a comprehensive university," Nutt asserted. "That was part of our founder Tom Monaghan's vision from the start. Because of our Catholic identity and liberal arts mission, he wanted to make sure that we were very strong in philosophy and theology and the humanities, but he also wanted to found a comprehensive university in the sense of having majors across the disciplines. I think the spread seen among the students and their interests shows that as we now mature into our third decade, we are realizing the vision of being comprehensive in nature, and not just one or two specialized programs."


According to Nutt, AMU students are in an enviable position, uniquely poised to find satisfying futures. In nursing, for example, where there is a high demand, students are often recruited by headhunters and sometimes even receive signing bonuses. Several students, both men and women, are entering the seminary or religious life. Many students will go on to impressive and attractive graduate programs, too.

"I'm happy for them," Nutt reflected. "They're a coveted bunch of people in





church, corporate world and graduate schools. Anecdotally, I can say that I am not aware of a single instance where a student who wants an opportunity hasn't been able to find one." $\geq <$

Donahue Academy's Largest Senior Class Achieves Unprecedented Success

As the school year ends, Donahue Academy bids the graduating class of 2024 a farewell after years of continued academic excellence.

Marc Snyder, Donahue Academy's principal, believes students' success can be attributed mainly to the structure of the continuous curriculum and the staff's collaborative efforts to identify where students need the most assistance.

"It really starts from the early ages because every grade really builds on the previous one," said Snyder. "When you have a K-12 school, you have a curriculum that is horizontally and vertically aligned. You also have teachers that are working sideby-side, constantly communicating with one another about how the students are doing."

Donahue Academy's class of 2024 has exceeded standards in more ways than one. With 32 graduates, this year will see the school's largest graduating class to date.

The school's pristine 100% college acceptance rate remains untouched. About twothirds of the senior class will attend Ave Maria University, reflecting the school's values and the importance students place on their education during college. Out of that pool, almost half of those students will receive \$15,000 dollars or more annually in merit-based scholarships.

Among the other colleges and universities chosen are the University of Notre Dame, Thomas Aquinas College, Christendom College, the University of Dallas, the Franciscan University of Steubenville and St. John Vianney College Seminary.

Out of 32 students, 13 of them have qualified for the Florida Bright Futures Scholarship Program, which establishes lottery-funded scholarships to reward Florida high school graduates for high academic achievement.

Donahue Academy is acclaimed for its student body's high-performing SAT scores, even being named Southwest Florida's Highest Scoring School in 2022. This year was no exception!

With an average SAT score of 1195, the class of 2024 performed 167 points above the 2023 national average of 1028. The highest SAT score in the grade was 1530, only 70 points shy of a perfect score.

Mary Fairchild, a senior at Donahue Academy, was named a National Merit Commended Scholar. The award is given in recognition of a high-performing PSAT score, as well as an overall outstanding academic performance.

Almost half of the Donahue seniors who took the challenging National Latin Exam earned honors, further underscoring the academic rigor and dedication of the student body.

In addition to academics, Donahue Academy's sports teams performed well this year.

Both the girls' and boys' high school basketball teams were named the Paradise Coast Athletic Conference (PCAC) champions. The high school boys' soccer team also took home the PCAC championship


for their sport. The high school football team was awarded the Sunshine State Athletic Association Central Division Conference Championship, as well as the SSAA Football Sportsmanship Award.

Both inside the classroom and out on the court, Donahue Academy's class of 2024 has been a shining example of young excellence. The senior class's unbridled desire for success and drive to learn is something Principal Snyder hopes students will take with them beyond graduation.

"We believe in instilling a love for learning in students," Snyder said. "We want to place value in terms of not just using



school as a platform to get some job down the road, but really embracing the educational experience. We want our students to be lifelong learners." $2^{1/2}$







usually two or three women will play. "We welcome everybody in our community," Chervets said.

That means everybody from former collegiate linebackers to men in their 70s and female pharmacists and children. "We're not trying to intimidate anybody," Chervets said. "We want them to come back."

Jessica Nguyen, a pharmacist at the Ave Maria Publix, enjoys playing softball every other weekend. Hailing from Minnesota, where she played high school softball, Nguyen finds the game to be "way fun" and an enjoyable way to stay active. After a sharp hit resulting in a flyout to center, Nguyen remarked, "It's a fun way to exercise."

One of the returning players this week was Chervets' 26-year-old younger brother, Shawn Chervets. Shawn was visiting and said he has played four or five times and likes the relaxed atmosphere.

"We all make sure everybody is safe," Shawn said. "That's the main thing. Make sure everybody is taken care of." By the way, the pitchers pitch from behind a screen as a safety precaution so nobody is winged by a line drive.

All are welcome, with the informal age limit of 18-plus being more of a guideline than a strict rule. Occasionally, children as young as 10 join in, encouraged to enjoy the game and contribute. "We let them play and let them get a base hit," said Angel Rivera, one of the regulars at age 53.

However, amidst this diversity, three things remain constant across generations: camaraderie, exercise and fun. The atmosphere is vibrant and jovial.

Competitiveness inevitably creeps in, but it's balanced with a sense of sportsmanship. Rivera, who oversees the games, emphasizes the importance of keeping the spirit light and injury-free.

MEET A TOWNMAKER Donny Diaz, Operations Manager for Special District Services

Donny Diaz may have been given a new title last October, but he is certainly not new to Ave Maria. As Operations Manager for Special District Services, he oversees public works for the town. This position feels almost like destiny for a property management professional who has been working here in one capacity or another since 2009. Although he lives in Lehigh Acres with his wife Jenny and teenagers Anthony and Mariah, he considers Ave Maria his second home.

Leading a two-person crew (soonto-be three), Diaz is responsible for maintaining the safety and aesthetics of all common roadways, sidewalks, landscaping, waterways, fountains, streetlights and street signs within the Ave Maria Special District. Under his supervision, lead technician Michael Davis Campbell and maintenance tech Jose Concepcion Escobedo are out in the field in their trucks, picking up fallen trash, clearing storm drains, maintaining doggie stations and patrolling public areas to identify any infrastructure issues proactively.

If there's a pothole in the road, a fallen branch blocking a sidewalk, a rogue irrigation head or a broken fountain, Diaz will document it, assess the damage and manage the repairs. When the team can't fix it themselves, he may call in an approved contractor for smaller or emergency items. For larger expenditures, Diaz must bring a proposal to the Ave Maria Stewardship Community District Board for discussion and approval, at which point he will assist in any required bidding process.

"My role is basically to manage all public assets, make sure they are being maintained correctly, and make sure we set and follow bud-gets," he explained. "I sign off on all the work orders to make sure that the contractors we hire are doing the job up to our standards before they get paid." Diaz can often be seen on-site with the Davey Tree landscapers. He also manages relationships with a range of vetted contractors, including an electrician who conducts monthly streetlight inspections and repairs; fountain repair companies for complex jobs; and roadway resurfacing teams when it's time to add a new layer of asphalt.

Storm drain maintenance is another focus. "We want to keep our waterways and infrastructure sys-

"I want residents to know that I'm here for them. My job is to make sure that they hadn't intended to make it a career, but fate had other plans. "I just wanted to make some money until I figured out what I wanted to do, but it just took off," he reflected. "I had a mentor at the landscape company, Clarence Grim, and he saw the potential in me. 'Stick with it. You're going to be my guy,' he said, and sure enough, he came through. He was our operations guy and eventually became a branch manager."

Grim put Diaz through the ranks, from the bottom up. "I started as an edger, to weeder, blower, mower, then irrigation, before he sent me out to do route jobs as a foreman of a crew driving the truck, where you have 45 to 60 minutes at each house, and if you don't get all your contracts done, you're working late," he says. "That's when my management kicked in, and I would tell my guys what to do so we could knock those out with no problem. Then Grim put me on an on-site job where you're at one site all day, but now you're responsible for 900 homes to mow, and the expectations are different."

After experiencing every aspect of the landscape business, Diaz was ready to take on more responsibility. That's when he was promoted to account manager, a well-paying, high-responsibility position with 36 workers under his supervision. "By then, the management was easy," Diaz said. "Grim told me later on that the reason he put me through every part of the landscaping business was so that when I became an account manager, I would know what to expect from every position. When you know how hard it is, you know how to treat people and how hard you can push them. Grim also taught me about budgets. 'Treat it like it's your money,' he told me."

In 2009, one of his landscaping accounts became Ave Maria, where he built a great rapport with the property manager, sharing his ideas about how to oversee landscaping, as well as his vision for this community. When an opening came up to be maintenance supervisor for the Ave Maria Master Association, he was offered the job. Feeling an affinity for the town, he accepted the position in 2013. Diaz has been committed to the betterment of this town ever since. "I want residents to know that I'm here for them. My job is to make sure that they are safe and that their town is beautiful, and when they step outside, they say, 'This is where I want to be.' I take so much pride in this town. Ask anybody. I've stuck through it here, and I want to see it out. When my time comes, I want to know that I gave them 10,000 percent, that I laid it all on the line."

tems flowing, making sure we don't have flooding, so we're constantly looking to make sure that nothing is getting obstructed," Diaz explained. Mulch is no longer applied because rainstorms were causing it to flow into the storm drains. "We're constantly adjusting, learning and asking, 'What can we do better?' Right now, we're working on a contractor to come out at least once a year and inspect our storm drains and make sure that we vacuum them out as regular maintenance."

The safety of the residents is always job number one. "With any contractor, if they're going to work on sidewalks or roadways, I've got to make sure they have reflectors and set up a safety zone around their vehicles to provide the appropriate level of safety," Diaz said. "Before we even let them come out, I want to make sure they have all the necessary equipment like safety cones, men-working signs and reflective clothing."

Diaz embraces the customer service component of his job. "Sometimes, a resident may be irate about something we did or didn't do, and I always tell my team, you have to listen to their concerns, always be kind and professional, never get mad, and tell people the facts and the rules that you're following," he said. "But what I'm really trying to do is get ahead of all that. I are safe and that their town is beautiful."

don't want them to have anything to complain about."

Diaz comes from humble beginnings. He was born and raised in Robstown, Texas, a poor town where his father worked in an oil refinery. He still remembers the terrible oil smell on his dad's clothing, vowing never to get into that kind of work. In 1996, when he was 15, the family moved to Immokalee, and he fell in love with Florida. "Besides the heat, mosquitos and love bugs, Florida is beautiful," he quipped.

His first job was in landscaping. He

ters in Santiago. "We are clearing the land, grading and compacting the soil, installing drainage and we hope to start building in less than three months."

Dialum's commitment to exceptional architecture is evident in its selection of Gonzalo Mardones to design its cutting-edge facility in Ave Maria. With a distinguished career defined by architectural brilliance and imaginative design solutions, Gonzalo Mardones brings a wealth of experience to this exciting project.

Born in Santiago de Chile, Mardones graduated with top honors from the Pontificia Universidad Católica de Chile. He has since garnered numerous accolades, including the prestigious First Prize in the Architecture Biennale for his outstanding contributions to architectural design.

As an honorary Fellow of the American Institute of Architects and author of several acclaimed books, Mardones' expertise will elevate Dialum's new building into a true architectural marvel.

Dialum does not manufacture raw glass; it buys ready-made sheets of glass with different features from global suppliers and applies various laminates and treatments using cutting-edge technology to add functional and aesthetic properties. Its products include impact glass, favored in Florida for its hurricane-resistant features; fireproof and bulletproof glass for public buildings, banks or applications that require high security; anti-slip and shower glass for bathrooms; lacquered glass for wall and furniture uses; and privacy glass, commonly used for conference rooms, which is clear but turns opaque with the touch of a switch.

"To make impact glass, for example, we apply two treatments called tempering and lamination, in which we take the raw glass into a high-temperature oven and then lower the heat very quickly," Diez explained. "This gives the glass many mechanical properties. Then we join two, three or more sheets of this glass with an intermediate layer called SentryGlass, which is a plastic material that glues the sandwich together."

Using digital printing capabilities, Dialum can also add color, photographs and other artistic elements to the glass for interior design applications. Using a waterjet cutting machine, the glass can be transformed into shapes or perforated with customized logos or other geometric elements. In the furnace, giant glass

sheets are curved for architectural uses.

The plant at Ave Maria will also serve as a showroom where homeowners, window contractors and interior designers can see the applications for themselves and make custom orders. "A showroom is very important because people need to see, touch and try things before they buy them," Diez said. "Our plant is already a showroom. We are very proud of it. We are a very orderly and very clean operation."

In Chile, Dialum is recognized as a leading company in sustainability and ecological practices, according to Diez. "Although in Ave Maria we will consume a lot of electricity, we are a company that does not generate pollution," he asserted. "Both in Chile and soon in the U.S., we will maintain corporate policies committed to environmental protection, while also worrying about the well-being of all the people and local communities around us."

Dialum employs a closed-circuit, reverse-osmosis system to recycle the water used in glass cutting, allowing for its continuous reuse. None of the company's operations use fossil fuels, thus eliminating CO2 emissions. All of its machinery, including vehicles, forklifts and cranes, runs on electricity. The company does not produce waste because any leftover glass and other leftover or damaged materials are returned to the manufacturers to be melted down and turned back into usable material.

Dialum is a family business founded in 1987 in Talcahuano, Chile. "My father founded the company and is currently the president, while I, the eldest son, am also deeply involved in the business," Diez explained. From humble beginnings, they have grown the organization to encompass more than 300,000 square feet of production space, employing approximately 300 people. In addition to the Santiago headquarters, they have additional facilities in Concepción, as well as one in Buenos Aires, Argentina.

"The Florida market is very huge, and we are very excited to go over there," Diez noted. "Establishing a plant in Florida is going to give us the ability to reduce our response lead time for customers significantly and to offer a much better sales service. But this is the tip of the iceberg—the first, but not the last, plant in the United States."

Diez found Ave Maria to be an obvious choice for several compelling reasons. Its strategic location between Miami and Tampa, with easy access to Port Everglades in Fort Lauderdale for glass shipments, made it highly favorable. Collier County's generous incentives and welcoming environment further solidified the decision.

When Dialum engaged the Tabla Group to locate an optimal site for their Florida facility, they conducted an extensive statewide search. Their criteria included convenient transportation links for distributing products across Florida and Georgia, as well as a skilled local workforce, appealing residential options for employees, and a hospitable community and municipality.

"The search stopped in Ave Maria," said Roberto Alvarez Vela, CEO of Tabla Group. "Furthermore, Barron Collier Companies was the right partner to work with. They have the infrastructure, knowledge and interest in developing the county. With the support of Bill McDaniel, District 5, Commissioner, they made it all possible."


"We have a very good relationship with the county; it was a smooth negotiation," Diez said. "They were very excited for us to be there, and we share common aspirations. We just want to offer jobs and do things the way they should be done. Without exploiting employees or the environment. We are on the same path with the county and trying to do things the right way."

Another plus for Ave Maria was its proximity to Immokalee, Florida Gulf Coast University and several technical schools from which Diez intends to recruit his labor force-approximately 60 to 80 people initially. 

Taking the Safer Route: Adapting to New Florida State Golf Cart Laws

Collier County Sheriff Cpl. Lee Van Gelder knows something about golf carts that not everybody knows but probably should.

'They are not toys," Van Gelder said. "People sometimes think of them as toys." Golf carts are mechanized vehicles sub-

ject to laws and regulations.

They are as ubiquitous in Ave Maria as sunshine, palm trees and friendly people.

A drive or walk around town backs up that observation. Also, the statistics back it up.

Sal D'Angelo, the director of operations for Special District Services, estimated that there are approximately 1,544 Ave Maria carts registered with the community as of mid-April. However, this number is likely increasing daily, and there may also be additional unregistered carts in use.

They share the road with larger, more powerful vehicles and also bicyclists and pedestrians.

Even first-time visitors to Ave Maria can't help but notice it is a golf cart community. The vehicles are used for transportation to work, the gym, The Bean, Publix, Tropical Smoothie Cafe, and practically everywhere else, serving as the primary mode of transportation for residents across various activities and errands.

The Sanchez family is an example. "I tell people we're a golf cart town," said Serafin 'Serf" Sanchez.

As with any vehicle from a motorcycle to a 747, there are rules, regulations and laws that govern the use and operation of golf carts.

In 2023, a new Florida law, HB 949, took effect regarding golf carts. It raised the minimum age for drivers to 15 and they must have a learner's permit to operate a cart.

Golf carts are not toys for children, as Van Gelder is well aware. In 2023, a 7-yearold boy in Fort Myers was tragically killed by a cart driven by a 3-year-old.

Van Gelder is concerned with golf cart safety. He urges drivers to stay below 20 miles per hour and not get souped-up carts, ones he calls "golf carts on steroids."

He knows many families drive around town with their kids. "Kids are our primary concern," Van Gelder said.

Carts with four seats should have only four passengers. "It's not uncommon to see one with six people hanging on to it," Van Gelder said.

Tallahassee attorney Alyssa Willson, special counsel for the Ave Maria Stewardship Community District, said that golf carts may be operated within Ave Maria "in accordance with the Collier County Ordinance 2016-14 requirements."

driven on roads or streets with speed limits of 35 miles per hour or lower. These vehicles must be equipped with seat belts, headlights, brake lights, turn signals, taillights, reflex reflectors, parking brakes, rearview mirrors, windshields, and vehicle identification numbers. Additionally, they must be registered, insured and titled.

This is how a state statute defines golf carts, "A motor vehicle that is designed and manufactured for operation on a golf course for sporting or recreational purposes and that is not capable of exceeding 20 miles per hour."

Van Gelder has been stationed in Ave Maria since 2019 and has seen the number of golf carts grow as the community has grown.

D'Angelo knows what those ubiquitous and colorful golf carts mean to Ave Maria and the community.

'The golf cart is just an extension of the community," D'Angelo said.

Blue stickers indicate that a cart is registered and legal. The Sanchez family has a six-passenger

Evolution brand cart that is almost always in use. Sanchez said the family cart now has 7,500 miles on it.

Serf and his wife, Lourdes, have five

chez said.

The cart is the family's connection to the wonders of Ave Maria. That definitely includes all five kids.

"They love the freedom," Sanchez said. He understands the need for regulations and making sure everybody, from drivers to passengers to pedestrians, are safe in a community with more than 1,500 golf carts.

'They're trying to cut down on the younger kids driving," Sanchez remarked.

One of the many beauties of Ave Maria, of course, is how convenient everything is to everything else.

It takes only five to seven minutes for the Sanchez family to travel by golf cart to Publix.

Their cart is electric so there is no need to gas it up. "It's easy to charge," Sanchez said.

Go anywhere in the community and one will see golf carts. Stop by South Park on Sunday mornings when residents gather to play softball and one will see several carts parked near the field.

Softball player Angel Rivera drives his cart to the field. In addition to the convenience there is another factor.

Golf Cart Driving Safety Tips

- · Use seatbelts, if available, since they may be required when driving on public streets
- Advise all passengers to keep feet, legs, hands and arms inside the vehicle at all times.
- Do not start driving until all passenaers are fully seated.
- Operate the golf cart from the driver's seat ONLY.
- Check that the direction selector is in the correct position before accelerating.
- · Obey and follow all traffic rules, whether on the golf course or

They are included, said Willson, who works in the Tallahassee office of Kutak Rock LLP, in the Ave Maria Golf Cart Drivers' Handbook.

A detail that likely all golf cart owners know is the maximum allowed speed is 20 miles per hour. They are considered low speed vehicles.

"While they may look visibly similar, low speed vehicles are a different classification of vehicle with different legal requirements," Willson said. "Low speed vehicles have a top speed of greater than 20 miles per hour but not greater than 25 miles per hour."

The rules are clear and definitive about golf carts. "Critical to the classification is not the speed at which the vehicle is driven, but the maximum speed at which the vehicle could be operated," Willson said. Low-speed vehicles are allowed to be

children. They range in age from 6 to 18 years old. The cart has a festive look to it.

"It looks like a Carnival Cruise ship," Sanchez joked.

Serf uses the cart in his job as a real estate professional with The Keyes Company showing clients and potential clients around town.

The cart is also used by his wife and kids for trips around town. Cart time is valued and often becomes a race between Serf and his oldest daughter, 18-year-old Sera, to see who can get in the driver's seat first.

As they venture out from their Maple Ridge residence, whether for a quick trip to the Town Center for a meal, workout session, or grocery run at Publix, they frequently encounter friends and neighbors cruising around in their golf carts.

"You feel a kinship with people," San-

"I get all smelly and I hop in my car, and it ends up smelling," Rivera said.

That's not an occurrence with golf carts. Sports and scents are a reason why softball player Glenn Gaudio often drives his three children to and from sports events in a golf cart. He has sons, Dominic, 12, and Vincent, 9 and a 3-year-old daughter Iulianne.

In addition to not getting in the car smelly and sweaty from whatever sport they may have played, there's another reason the Gaudio family use a golf cart to zip around town. The kids enjoy the cart rides, particularly Julianne.

"She always wants to go for a ride," Gaudio said.

She is far from alone in Ave Maria. It seems nearly everybody wants to go for golf cart rides! 🏒
