New sports fields, pickleball courts and playground upgrades

Residents find peace of mind in Ave Maria during hurricane season

Peter and Judy Clouet lived near Miami and used to fear approaching hurricanes. Now that fear is gone. Three years ago, they moved to Del Webb Naples in Ave Maria where they feel very safe from storms. This fall when Hurricane Milton was approaching and people all over Southwest Florida were evacuating and setting up sandbags, the Clouets simply took down their flag and some outdoor decorations, and they were ready for some rain and wind.

"We bought this place because it is 24 miles inland," Peter said. "We just stay in the house and watch the wind blow. We have no fear at all."

With the state of Florida having some of the strongest building codes in the country, Ave Maria makes no exception when it comes to its builders and their homes. Being so far inland means the Gulf is not sending water down their streets and there are no rivers to overflow into homes. Residents also rarely lose power and if they do, it is quickly restored. Ave Maria is an inland community with underground power lines, a highly effective approach.

"In areas that are inland like Ave Maria underground facilities are ideal," said Karen Ryan, public relations director for Lee County Electric Cooperative (LCEC). "Some coastal areas do not have it underground and that is not ideal. Some of those areas are the last to be restored because water and electricity do not mix. Like in the city of Marco Island, it is difficult to restore underground in a water area with all the salt water. And on the

new sports fields to pickleball courts and playground improvements, the expansion project promises to revitalize this popular community hub. A portion of the upcoming improvements in Ave Maria will be funded through a recent impact fee agreement with Collier County. Under the arrangement, the Ave Maria Master Association (AMMA) will collect community and regional park fees from new home permits, which are typically paid directly to the county. This initiative aims to support local parks developments while enhancing amenities for residents, ensuring that growth in the area is matched with infrastructure upgrades.

New softball and Little League fields

One of the most anticipated changes to North Park is the addition of two new sports fields: a dedicated Little League field and a full-sized softball field; just mirroring the land behind the current two ball fields. These fields are expected to break ground soon, with the project slated for completion by Spring 2025.

Ave Maria Little League's board of directors' president, Lawayne Cheney, expressed his enthusiasm for North Park's additions, "I'm really looking forward to the day when our softball teams and little league players will be able to practice and play together in the same park. These new fields will help accommodate our growing league, as in-season, we near more than 250 players. There's a growing interest for recreational sports in Ave Maria, particularly for families and their involvement in youth sports leagues, so we very much welcome how these improvements will expand our efforts with young residents wanting to play ball."

In addition to the new fields, the park's two existing ball fields will also receive significant upgrades, including improved drainage systems, new sod and refurbished infields. These upgrades aim to provide better playing conditions and enhance the overall sports experience.

Pickleball courts to meet growing popularity





South Park tennis courts and benches

Playground overhaul coming to North Park's tot lot

For families with young children, there's exciting news regarding North Park's tot lot. On Nov. 11, work began to remove the former playground equipment in the tot lot. This overhaul will feature new, modern play structures. As the old equipment is removed and the new pieces installed, a portion of the playground will be closed temporarily, but the project is expected to be completed by the beginning of 2025. This upgrade is part of the ongoing effort to improve North Park as a family-friendly destination for all ages.

Kim Twiss, executive director for the Ave Maria Master Association (AMMA), emphasized the importance of the tot lot renovation, "The renovation of the tot lot was absolutely necessary, because as our community grows, it's essential that we provide up-to-date, accessible playground equipment. This new tot lot is bright and provides a lot of interaction for youngster's curiosities."

Phase 2: New multipurpose field


As part of the ongoing expansion of North Park, Phase 2 will introduce a large multipurpose field located to the west of the current soccer fields. This new addition is designed to accommodate a wide range of sports and recreational activities, offering a versatile space for the community. The multipurpose field will be large enough to host regulation soccer games, as well as football, lacrosse and other field-based sports.

Anticipated to be completed in the next couple of years, Phase 2 aims to enhance the park's capacity to support both organized leagues and casual recreation. The new field is expected to not only benefit local sports teams but also provide an important resource for school programs, community events and larger tournaments organized by the AMMA parks & recreation management team, plus organized sports groups like the Ave Maria Little League.

With these exciting upgrades, North Park and South Park will continue to serve as vital community gathering spaces. Whether you're a sports enthusiast, a teenager looking to join a sports club, a parent looking for a fun spot to family picnic, or someone who enjoys outdoor recreation, these improvements are sure to enhance the quality of life and Blue Zone standard in Ave Maria. As the construction moves forward, residents can anticipate a revitalized park system that offers something for everyone.

Fellowship Church prepares for their new home and hope

The beginnings of Fellowship Church in Ave Maria weren't easy. They shared a space with Mafa Martial Arts in a Park of Commerce storefront attached to the Mobil gas station, so every Sunday about an hour and a half before the service began, they had big preparations to make.

"We would come in at 3:30 p.m. and pick up all the sweaty mats," described Pastor Timothy Pigg. "There was a punching bag in the middle of the room that we had to work around."

Three years later, they had the space to themselves allowing the church to put down carpet, move walls and have the sweaty mats and punching bags permanently gone. Now they are planning even bigger and better things as they get ready to break ground on a new stand-alone church. Tremendous growth in the community and the congregation has sparked the need to keep expanding.

Fellowship Church began in Ave Maria in 2017 with about 40 members. And now about 135 people congregate into the facility every Sunday. The nursery and children's rooms are small and cramped too. That's why Pigg and his congregation are planning for the new church building. Fellowship Church is buying 5.5 acres of land from Pulte in an area behind the Bellera community in Del Webb. They are currently designing the new church that Pigg said will be much more than a place to worship. It will be a place for the

community.

"When you walk into a home, you want to feel like you are at home," Pigg said. "You want it to be relaxing. We will have a seating area to relax, sit on the couch and have a cup of coffee. The foyer we designed to be like a massive living room. The goal is to even have places where members can have coffee almost like an internet café. The hope is that the cafe area is open to the public all day long, almost like a small business center for digital nomads to come and work."

Members are excited about the future with a new church campus.

"It is going to be awesome," Worship Pastor Mi-

it to be a comfortable gathering place, not just on Sunday morning. We envision being able to come into the lobby and sit with your friend, share a cup of coffee and open your Bible. We envision it as a space where you can be surrounded by friends."

Pigg is also excited about enhancing and expanding the children's area.

"It will be a second to none," he described. "The children's area will have activities with themes at an appropriate level, so our kids are learning at a very

early age to love God."

Jeremy Breitag is one of the pastors who oversees the children's area. He said the new nursery and school rooms will have more space for volunteers, decorations and activities.

"Just to have those upgraded and new rooms for the families. I can't wait for that," Breitag said. "The current rooms are a little older and out of date. The new rooms will be so exciting. It will be great to see new younger families have a place to worship. The building will be bigger so there is the opportunity for more people to come and worship together."

It will also give them room to possibly add schoolchildren someday. Currently, 53 students attend the Fellowship School on their Immokalee campus. That school grew from just six students in 2019, and Pigg expects it to continue to grow, making it possible to expand the school to Ave Maria.

"We anticipate being able to use the

new building for education from preschool all the way up to college work and postgraduate," he said. "We don't know if we will relocate the school, but as it grows, it allows us to have greater expansion."

The new 15,000-square-foot church will have room for 350-400 in the sanctuary, up from the 175-180 they can accommodate now. It won't have any stained-glass windows, but it will have a lot of clear glass.

"It is going to be a design that invites you and makes you feel comfortable to come in," Pigg explained. "There will be a lot of glass in the front because we want you to see what is going on inside."

Outside, Pigg envisions a courtyard with picnic tables, a playground and areas for worship nights and concerts under the stars.

"We really hope to use the new property in a way that is integrated into the life of Ave Maria," Pigg stressed. "We don't want to be set apart. We want to be part of the community."

Being part of the community is the reason Pigg believes Fellowship Church has been growing so quickly. He said that while Fellowship Church has a great relationship with the Catholic Church, some people want other options for worship.

"Not everyone is Catholic. By giving people another option to find the Lord, we found it an excellent opportunity to move in here. We have all of those that come from all different backgrounds of Christianity that are part of the church family, and it is a wonderful thing," he said.

Pigg points to community outreach as another reason for the church's popularity. He said church members are very involved in the area as part of everything

from Little League, golf clubs and Rotary Club to participating in festivals and annual cook-offs.

Pigg said the goal is to encourage even more members at both their Ave Maria and Immokalee campuses. He would like to have 700 members by 2027 and 1,000 people across both campuses by 2031.

Church members and pastors are excited about how far they have come since the church began and they are hopeful for the future.

"Obviously, we have made do with little," Maggie Meffen said, who is part of the worship team. "Our goal is not to have flashy things, but our goal is to have more space. We are excited to expand our resources, to be able to not only worship God but to reach the community."

"It was a fun time when we started," her husband Micah Meffen added. "It was the start of something new and a lot of wonderful people ended up joining. It is crazy to think that in the last seven years we went from sharing it with a karate studio to now. I consider myself really blessed to have seen the growth and the people it has impacted."

Groundbreaking for the new church building is expected to happen during the first quarter of 2025 and church officials hope to have the church built and ready for the public by Easter 2026, or at the latest, the summer of 2026. 2/2

Gyrene Nation How Ave Maria athletes balance passion and purpose

On a weekday evening late in the supper hour, Ava Murphy is talking to a reporter. Patiently, intently, with no sense of urgency or haste, as if she has nothing better to do.

A starting guard for the Gyrenes and a senior from Kansas City studying health sciences at Ave Maria University, Murphy is in women's basketball, not boot camp. That doesn't alter the fact she's been up since about 5 a.m. to make the 5:30 to 7:30 a.m. practice for coach Alex Moorehead before attending an 8:15 a.m. class followed by two other classes during the day and putting in afternoon work time for her job at the campus store.

What about studying? What about carrying on off-the-court conversations with teammates, friends and professors? What about having a social life — maybe going out for a pizza or a full meal at a restaurant in the university town? What about just stopping to breathe and think, read an unassigned book, maybe stare at videos on the internet? Sure, all that, too, is part of a sports education here.

As it turns out, sports at Ave Maria University (AMU), an NAIA school in the Sun Conference, is learning. Sports are life. Sports are a part of the whole human being, just as academics are. That's why about half of the on-campus student body of 1,400 or so takes part in team sports, competing against other colleges and universities. More than 25 sports are offered for men and women at the university.

In addition, many students who aren't competing in those programs nevertheless participate in intramural and club sports.

By comparison, University of Florida data shows one in 70 or about 1.4% of the student population are participating in a varsity sport at the Division 1 school in Gainesville. There, Ben Hill Griffin Stadium holds 88,458 seats for people who like to sit and watch a football game where 22 other people compete at any one time.

For Murphy and most fellow athletes, perhaps, all of its comparatively easy. Coach Moorehead, after all, has two small chil-

dren ages 3 and 1 to worry about at home, and he made the 5:30 pre-dawn practice too - as always, appearing poised, fresh and ready to go, his players say, whether or not he feels that way.

That's probably not that easy. And after

practice, he jumps into his day as director of the university's intramural and club sports programs.

Lesson one: If you're going to lead, lead.

life," said Moorehead. "I talk with team members about grace under pressure. We're developing and fostering strong qualities in the classroom and in life, not just on the basketball court."

The son of two career military veterans of the Air Force from Oklahoma, Moorehead played college basketball himself and went on to play overseas, where he also earned a master's degree in Ireland.

Now, he's pursuing a doctorate from Concordia University Chicago, a Lutheran school, he said.

To apply for the job at Ave Maria, Moorehead did a virtual interview from the hospital room where his first child had just been born in Oklahoma City. His future employers at Ave may only have seen him from the waist up in that interview a brand-spanking-new father in a hospital room with his wife and his firstborn — but he did it right because that's what commitment means.

"I wore a full suit, anyway," he recalled. Lesson two: No matter what you do in life, do it right. Bring everything you have and do it with everything you have.

Gvrene nation

That's as important a lesson as anything anywhere, insists Wil Hampton, associate director of Athletics. A sportscaster in Indiana for 25 years

ly describes U.S. Marines, with whom Ave Maria founder Tom Monaghan once saw service.

Sports at Ave Maria are paradoxical: they are both lighthearted and playful but also deeply serious and intense, said athletes, coaches and administrators.

"We love to be challenged. People love to strive for excellence. People love to push themselves to overcome obstacles. And born out of the gaming is resiliency in life," said Vice President of Student Affairs Kimberly King, who came to Ave Maria after her days as a distance runner at Division 1 University of Richmond. That competitive beginning was followed by 22 years as a coach and later athletic director at the State University of New York at Binghamton. Her son, Jacob King, who was head of the Marathon Club during his undergraduate days at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, is now an assistant track and cross-country coach under Alan Webb, the head coach. Webb happens to be one of the finest distance runners the United States ever produced, a Michigander originally who held the American record in the mile run at 3:46.91 for 16 years, from 2007 to 2023, and won the World

who also worked for the Indianapolis Colts in the AFC of the National Football League, he said, "One of my major goals here is to improve the overall experience for student-athletes. What they're doing is as big as what they're doing at Notre Dame."

Arguably bigger if "big" is defined as the big picture in life for every student and student-athlete, not just the numbers in the win/loss column.

One of the things Hampton does himself — for students and any other listeners - is join Head Football Coach Joe Patterson to host an on-air show, Gyrene Nation, every Thursday. The show can be found either by going to the website avemariagyrenes.com and clicking on "media" or by a search for "Gyrene Nation" on YouTube. "Gyrene" is a nickname that traditionalChampionship in the event.

A sports team at Ave Maria "is a community, working toward common goals held by people with shared values and interests — almost like a family would be," Kim King added. "Your teammates are your closest relations."

When she talks about sports here on the college level — when other coaches and athletes at Ave Maria reflect on their vocations — there is no mention of NIL, the Name, Image, Likeness rules that now allow college athletes to benefit financially, sometimes in huge amounts, by selling themselves to promote a business or product.

They aren't against it, some say, they just don't see it as fundamental to sports.

"A lot of it here is aligned with the growth of the human person. It's about formation," King added. "These are great opportunities to form the whole person."

In the most pragmatic sense, a lot can come anyway of what happens on a football field, a soccer field, a basketball court, a cross country course, a track, a baseball or softball field, in a swimming pool, on a tennis court or (take a deep breath), in golf, pickleball, rugby, lacrosse, ultimate Frisbee, beach volleyball or dance, to name some.

"Employers are looking for people such as athletes. It's because of the ways you must learn to get along, to be around people who don't always have the same personality or background. Doing that can help your work, it can help your marriage, it helps in raising children," King said. "It teaches you how to be more selfless. There's a huge amount of resilience in this generation that's missing."

People who work together

But not missing at Ave Maria, apparently. Describing the reason she puts so much into basketball — aside from the fact that her father also played college basketball, and her parents are proud of her — Murphy quotes scripture, one of her favorite

passages she keeps in her room on campus, from Proverbs.

"Iron sharpens iron, and one man sharpens another.' It's cool here we can be so open about our faith," she said. The line reminds her of one of her closest friends in sports, school and life, she revealed fellow basketball guard Elena Barnes, a junior from Milwaukee.

That thinking is by no means confined to Ave Maria, or for that matter, to one generation.

In 2020, for example, Catholic apologist John Clark, writing for The Catholic Register after attending an October football game at Ave Maria where his daughter, Philomena, was going to school, offered the following observation:

"Vince Lombardi, the Green Bay Packers coach often considered to be the greatest ever, as well as a daily communicant, once observed, 'People who work together will win, whether it be against complex football defenses or the problems of modern society.' After speaking to AMU's coaches and seeing their teaching styles, they are trying to develop persons rather than simply players."

Clark pointed to football coach Patterson, who graduated from Villanova University before teaching literature and coaching football at St. John's College High School in Washington, D.C., for 19 years and earning a master's in Catholic leadership from The Catholic University of America. He came to Ave Maria to build not only the football program but additional sports programs, as well. He is now also the director of Athletics and a vice president at the university.

"Many of the lessons learned on the competitive field are going to translate into life, and so at Ave you have a chance to pursue those lessons in a manner that is consistent with the faith," Patterson said.

He added, "Controlling the line of scrimmage isn't just about football; it's about life. It's about developing yourself so you can protect those you love; it's about courageously taking the field to make a statement. And if you're truly blessed, you have coaches and teachers who can help you accomplish those remarkable things in a beautiful place to learn them."

Patterson hasn't stopped teaching, either. He hosts an online course, one of a number offered by the university in its "Pursuit of Wisdom" series, in this case called "Athletics and the Virtues."

"The discussion is framed within the context of the three bedrock principles of the Ave Maria Athletics Department: effort, toughness and love," according to the course description.

That's how Murphy, a basketball player who probably hasn't spent a lot of time on the gridiron, may see both sporting and living, too — how many in sports view the place of games in their lives.

She transferred from the University of Missouri at Kansas City, where she played Division 1 basketball.

"I had no faith, and in my freshman and sophomore years, I was finding out who I was on the court. Transferring allowed me to get a bigger picture (of life) than basketball, to be a leader for the other girls in different ways, on and off the court," she said. How?

"I had to lower my ego — it doesn't matter what division you're playing in. Being here at Ave taught me that. It allowed me to appreciate things. My ego may have been bigger coming out of high school, but the Lord kind of humbled me. I fell in love with the game again, kind of. I could play more freely."

So, what comes next for her? Because the final season of her final year at Ave isn't going to last forever, even if love does.

"I can't see myself away from the game," she said. "I'm thinking graduate school in health science and coaching."

It's a choice, a choice in the game of life, perhaps — one she's learned how to do well as an athlete for AMU.

Capturing beauty: The art of Sue Ellen Miller

There is no better way to learn about an artist than visiting their studio. Sue Ellen Miller's creative refuge is a converted den in her Ave Maria home where blank canvases lean against the wall and two large worktables are piled high with acrylic paint, bangles, bottles of craft paper, feathers, illustrated napkins, jewels, Mod Podge, ribbons, shells, stickers, trinkets and more-the building blocks of her artwork.

Completed paintings adorn the walls and half-finished throw pillows await final touches amid stacks of art books and reference magazines. Taking center stage is a 40-year-old Artograph projector that Miller acquired when she was in college and still uses to enlarge sketches or existing images up to 200 times their original size. By tracing a projected image onto a canvas, she can maintain the correct proportions of the 1950s-style female figures that dominate her pieces. Although all her paintings are untitled, she refers to them as "my ladies".


Hanging in a guest bedroom is one of her most treasured compositions, meant to honor her father who passed away last Christmas Eve-a golden-haired archangel in a white gown and bejeweled crown. "Usually, my ladies fight me, but this angel was the only painting that didn't fight me at all," Miller said. "I wanted her to be fierce. She came out perfect and will forever be the best. I thought about my father the whole time I painted her. It felt like a release. I knew she was finished when I looked at her and spontaneously said, 'Thank you."

What sets her paintings and pillows apart are the three-dimensional embellishments applied after the last brushstroke, including feathered corsets; colored stones and costume jewelry around the waist, wrist and head; and hairpieces made with paper flowers and handcrafted crepe paper. One of her favorite decorations is made of coffee filters that she paints with watercolors and bakes in the oven at very low heat to set the pigments. "I'm all about repurposing," she said proudly, adding that she learned this technique watching a YouTube video.

When Miller was 8 years old, she sold her first painting to her third-grade teacher. Her art has evolved after about 10 years of honing her skills with the help of private art tutors. She has published a series of arts-and-crafts instructional articles for Better Homes & Gardens magazine and has also auctioned her art for the Make-A-Wish Foundation. Today, her larger canvases start at \$2,000. "Some paintings I don't want to sell because they are a part of my heart," she said.

In everything she does, Miller seeks beauty. Having previously dabbled in interior design, she loves to rescue home decor and furnishings from the trash or secondhand stores-her favorite being Blue, the Goodwill boutique in the Ave Maria Town Center. When someone comes to visit, she proudly points out the marble console table by the front door acquired for only \$50, an antique textile enhanced with tassels that hangs on the bedroom wall and the sparkling broche-a family heirloom-encased in a shadowbox frame as a work of art. "I like to make things pretty with paint and imagination," she said. "If you have beauty in your heart, you spread it all over the world."

Saturday. Her art is also available at The Secret Ingredient in Town Center. According to owner Daneé Williams, "Her paintings and pillows are so colorful and unique. It always features a lady with such depth in her eyes and these incredible headpieces that are just gorgeous. I've sold three of her higher-end pieces so far and only have a couple of bracelets left. My favorite right now is an original pillow that has a hand-painted woman with opal jewels attached around her face."

After retiring from a career as a hematology technician, Miller moved to Ave

Maria two years ago to be closer to her sister, who lives in Bonita Springs. "I love my neighbors. All of my doctors are here. I drive my golf cart everywhere. I have a pool. It's a nice lifestyle. Now that I'm here in Ave Maria, I have no interest in going on vacation. I already live in paradise," she said.







Remodeled Welcome Center opens its doors

After a four-month closure, the renovated Ave Maria Welcome Center is complete and open to the public. This makeover is bold in scope and execution—an impressive upgrade for the town.

When the Ave Maria Development (AMD) team set out to reimagine this space, they dreamed big, hoping to create a location that was joyous, welcoming and engaging for all visitors, including potential home buyers, residents and their families, vacationers and festivalgoers. The idea was to invigorate that corner of Town Center and turn it into a hub of friendly interaction that reflects the active lifestyles and vibrant communities in Ave Maria.

"We wanted to capture the essence of Ave Maria and have people understand the town better by visiting the space," said Michelle Mambuca, marketing and public relations manager of town developer, Barron Collier Companies (BCC). "The new welcome center showcases the beauty of Ave Maria and the fun atmosphere we have in town. Visitors will receive a colorful, vibrant welcome with an invitation to have a snack and talk about what it's like to live in the community, what the best places to eat and shop are, and what all the builders offer."

Upon entering, visitors are greeted by a resplendent blue and white hospitality bar called Square One, where they can enjoy a cold beverage or cup of joe while chatting with one of the Welcome Center staff members, all of whom live in Ave Maria. "We named it Square One because this is where you start when you come in. It's an important connection point with our staff to ask questions and be comfortable like you're at home," Mambuca said. "Our staff members are very friendly and love to get to know people. They live right here in the communities. It's a chance to ask a resident, 'Hey, how do you like living here?' and get their honest opinion."

To the left of Square One, a dynamic wall with orange, green, yellow and blue accents feature photos of Ave Maria resi-

dents playing pickleball, shopping in Town Center, splashing at the Water Park, playing golf and dining at one of the many amazing restaurants. A brochure tower and two monitors feature the different builders and home styles, as well as information about upcoming events.

"The Ave Maria team wanted something that was fresh and exciting and inviting for the community and enticing for potential buyers," said Jenelle Lovings, Senior Interior Designer of Creative License International. "We focused mainly on the athletic amenities that are offered throughout the community. Pickleball has been one of the hot sports for the last few years, so you'll see touches of that theme throughout the space. Golfing is another major draw, so those amenities helped to guide some of the decisions that we made. We also wanted it to feel like you're walking through a neighborhood with trees overhead and park benches to stop and take a break. Being outside in Florida is always beautiful, so we brought that feel into the interior of the space in a functional and fun way."

The wall art was put together by creative agency Milesbrand, which has been working with Ave Maria Development for many years. "They know our brand well, and they have been working on our new Real Stories campaign, which highlights actual residents and their stories, capturing the lifestyle of Ave Maria, the sense of community, the connection, the activities, the families and the diversity we have here in A Big Kind of Small Town," Mambuca noted.

A meandering putting green invites visitors to hone their short game with the assistance of premium clubs and balls from Ave Maria's two golf courses—The National and the Panther Run Golf Club. Also on the green is a sky-blue golf cart that looks exactly like a retro convertible Bronco. "As we've gotten to know residents, we've come to understand that this is a golf cart-friendly town." Mambuca said. "People love their golf carts, even if they don't golf, because you can get anywhere in town on a golf cart, whether it's Publix, the Town Center or the new Midtown Plaza."

Caleb Polhill, co-owner of AAction Power Equipment, donated the custom-fabricated golf cart. "There's nothing like scooting around town in a convertible golf cart and enjoying life in this beautiful weather. We wanted a happy color, so we chose the sky blue, and it pops well with the green turf," he said, adding that customized golf carts are not uncommon. People like to spruce up their rides with fancy stereo systems, underbody lights or colors representing their favorite sports teams.

In the back corner of the Welcome Center are two selfie stations shaped like pickleball paddles with bench seating and neon lighting. "This is a fun place for residents to take a selfie for social media and tag us at @AveMariaFL or #AveMariaFL," Mambuca suggested. "I can imagine residents bringing their family when they're visiting and making a memory there."

Several maps adorn the new space, including an immense table with a detailed site plan of Ave Maria, as well as a vicinity map on a nearby wall that identifies points of interest beyond town, such as the beaches, airports, nature preserves and entertainment spots in neighboring Naples and Bonita Springs.

"We wanted to create a one-stop spot where people could learn everything about the town and plan their day—whether it's the businesses, upcoming events, the history of the town or the four home builders," Mambuca said. "We don't sell homes there. We sell the community and celebrate all of the exciting goings-on. Some people come in because they've never been here before, so we can help them decide what they can do while they're visiting. Others fall in love with Ave Maria, and we are happy to send them to the sales centers to pick out their dream home."

Every Tuesday in season, the Welcome Center sponsors free, one-hour narrated trolley tours, as well as live music in the Town Center. island of Sanibel, it is the same. There were houses [on the coast] with sand up to the doorknobs, so the wires are underground, the transformers above ground and what was above ground were washed away. Ave Maria is ideal because they don't have that storm surge. When it comes to electricity, you might think one solution fits everything, but that is not the case. In Ave Maria, underground makes sense, but in coastal areas, it doesn't."

Ryan said maintenance is also a reason for their success in Ave Maria. They routinely cut back vegetation near the big green boxes that the underground wires lead to. Doing this maintenance means less debris flying around during a storm.

"Even though we are underground, [the wires] are overhead somewhere," Ryan said. "So, vegetation management helps prevent flying debris." Residents appreciate not having to lug sandbags to their doors or having to evacuate.

"What a benefit to be 24 miles inland and to be out of the way of that storm surge. There's also no anxiety knowing all the houses are block," said Jim Anderson,

a Del Webb Naples resident. "I moved here in 2017 and that is when Hurricane Irma hit, so it went right over my house

130-mile-an-hour winds and no damage."

Anderson said he lost power for only a day during Hurricane Irma and never lost power during Hurricanes Milton or Helene. Anderson said he is also glad he didn't feel the need to buy expensive hurricane windows.

years and lost electricity for two hours total. All our power is underground, and we have our own water plant, too, and that also helps."

Serf Sanchez, a Maple Ridge resident

"I could not afford the hurricane windows," he admitted. "A lot of people on my street don't have hurricane windows, and that is okay."

"Nope, no preps for storm," he said. "I feel that confident. I have been here two

does some storm preparation, but doesn't feel threatened by hurricanes.

"I usually hire a college student to put up some shutters and make sure we have gas for the generator and go to Publix and buy nonperishable stuff. I feel very confident living here because we live further from the coast. We have our own water plant here, so we tend to not have any issues with water, and having the on-site EMS and fire station, we feel safe."

Sanchez appreciates that comfort after living for many years in an area threatened by humongous storms.

"Being from Miami originally, we have gone through many storms, so we are happy to be on this side of the coast and inland," Sanchez said. "We really don't have any issue with our street flooding which is another plus. We did have some

Sanchez said another huge benefit is the lower cost of insurance. Since homes are much less likely to be damaged by storms, flood insurance is not required, and regular insurance is cheaper.

"Many of us in this town are saving money with the cost of insurance," he emphasized.

Josh Graeve, Pulte division president, said out-of-state buyers watch storms on the news and could be fearful of living too close to the coast. They also have clients that live on the east or west coasts of Florida that are now seeking to avoid the yearly storm fears.

"Ian and Milton predominately had an impact on coastal or low-lying areas, or areas that were built some time ago, or were built with a lower level of material," Graeve said. "In Ave Maria, all the Pulte

homes are built to a 160-mile-per-hour wind rating, and every home is built a foot or more above the base flood eleva-

and certain locations within the region can have resilience more to wind and rain events," said Ben Crisafulli, Pulte's vice president of sales.

Kathleen Coppola is one of the people who moved from the coast inland to Ave Maria. She lived on North

Naples' Vanderbilt Beach for 25 years before moving to her Ave Maria community in 2015.

what is going to happen with storms, so you prepare with water and food and ice, and you batten down your house," Coppola said. "But we know that here our utilities are underground, so we are not affected as much. We had no outages at all with all the storms and we are at a high elevation, so we do not flood. We have had quite a few homebuyers visit from Naples and Bonita Springs looking for that reason and some

of them had their homes washed away and arrived with just the clothes on their back. It is very sad. It is horrible. We are seeing more people move to this area be-

cause it is safer."

Allyson Holland, District Manager of the Ave Maria Stewardship Community District, lives in Naples but said she would evacuate to Ave Maria if a huge hurricane was coming.

"It is a very safe community because of how inland it is and how high it is," Holland

stressed. "During storms, it is a very safe place to be." 24







Bigger and better: Oil Well Craft Beer expansion begins

Since it first opened in 2017, Oil Well Craft Beer (OWCB) has been a beloved watering hole, growing organically to meet the needs of a loyal clientele. Their first iteration was a small taproom in unit 500 of the Ave Maria Park of Commerce. In 2019, they added the unit 600 to accommodate extra seating and a three-barrel brewery that fulfilled co-owner Matt William's dream to create custom craft beers.

Today, he and his wife Daneé embark upon an ambitious new expansion that OWCB fans have been clamoring for. When all is said and done—by early to mid-2025—the popular gathering place will have taken over units 700 and 800, adding almost 3,000 square feet to include an event room, expanded kitchen and substantial upgrades to their craft beer operation.

"Everybody seems thrilled, and I'm excited to be able to bring it to Ave Maria and to see what the future holds for us and the community," Daneé said. "This expansion is needed, and we know it's time. You can just feel it. I'm really proud of my husband, myself and our staff because we're growing the right way. We didn't come into Ave Maria and take on four commercial units from the start. We grew steadily, and the community is the reason. They support us, they love us, they tell people about us, and we just feel very blessed."

Brewing and canning

The plan is to move all brewing to unit 800. Additions include four eight-barrel fermenters, as well as a half-barrel brewing system that will enable Brewmaster Ross Wright to experiment, making small batches without risking a lot of material. A new canning line will allow them to distribute their most popular beers in stores and other key distribution points around Southwest Florida.

"Our brewing capacity will increase about five-fold," Matt explained. "Once we go live with this bigger operation, we should be able to maintain 10 to 12 of our own beers and probably always have five to eight of our 20 taps for house favorites like our Scotch ale, our Irish red and our wheat beer. We're also hoping that a little bit of local distribution will help us from both a sales and marketing standpoint."

According to Matt, "We're making these changes because we need to. We've never been able to keep up with the production of our own beer. We can't make

it as fast as we go through it. The community has spoken and grown and supported us. That's why we need to expand the brewery."

Lunch and dinner

Up until this point, OWCB has been serving submarine sandwiches from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. and hosting food trucks for dinnertime. That's all about to change as they make major investments in their kitchen, which will inhabit unit 600, where the smaller brewery implements once were. An Italian wood-fired pizza oven is expected where handcrafted pies will be pulled from the fire and served piping hot. The expanded lunch and dinner menus will also feature a larger selection of sandwiches, salads, charcuterie boards and soups on colder days.

The Williams' youngest son, Reece, will head the new kitchen operation. In November, he took culinary lessons at The Pizza Tomorrow Summit in Orlando, and in early 2025, he will travel to Florence, Italy to learn traditional dough-making from the people who invented modern pizzas. The team also plans to add six to 10 staff members to serve patrons and work in the kitchen.

Event room

Unit 700 will be an event room accessible via a 10-foot, barn-style sliding door. "This space will give us a little bit of extra seating for diners, as well as a social room where we can have all of our regular programming like bingo, paint parties, karaoke, Rotary Club meetings,

trivia nights and holiday-themed parties," Matt shared. "And then, if people want to have a private event, which we get contacted about quite a bit, we will have the ability to shut that rolling door and let folks have their own private gathering while still maintaining our normal business hours in the current space."

The room will be equipped with many entertainment bells and whistles, including a small stage for live music, a film projector for movie nights, two to three televisions to watch sports games, a shuffleboard table, regulation-size cornhole platforms and dartboards over astroturf for tournaments, cozy booths and hightop seating and a small bar with five taps. "One other cool thing is that we're putting a glass garage door in the storefront of unit 700, so when the weather is nice, we can have that door up with an air curtain and have an indoor/

outdoor beer garden feel," Matt said.

Buildout schedule

Workers broke ground on the expansion in October, directed by Ave Maria architect and loyal OWCB customer Oscar Amaro. Units 500 and 600 will remain open throughout the buildout phase, although the brewery has already been disconnected. In the meantime, trusted local brewers have been com-





missioned to make OWCB's favorite brews offsite. The event room, kitchen and pizza oven should be open by January or February, and the brewery is expected to be operational by mid-2025.

Anniversary party

OWCB will celebrate its eighth anniversary from 3 p.m. to 9 p.m. Saturday, Jan. 18, with live music, food trucks and, hopefully, fresh pizzas from their brandnew wood-fire oven.

Located at 5334 Ave Maria Boulevard, OWCB is open from 11 a.m. to 10 p.m. Monday through Thursday and from 11 a.m. to 11 p.m. Friday and Saturday. When the new kitchen is complete, Sunday hours will be added. For more information, call 239-354-4454 or visit OilWellCraftBeer.com.



Thomas Peek, the person behind Ave Maria's growth

Thomas Peek thought he might get a certificate or some applause as he retired as chairman of the Board of Supervisors for the Ave Maria Stewardship Community District. Instead, he was surprised by having a street named after him.

"Certainly, I was surprised," Peek said. "I didn't know what to expect. I thought they might give me a certificate and that would have been fine. To have a street renamed for me, that was a big surprise. And I still don't know quite how to react to that. It was very nice."

Peek has been chairman of the board since it was formed 20 years ago. He was selected for that position because of his expertise in creating a community. He is a retired partner of Wilson Miller Barton and Peek, a Naples-based professional engineering, surveying and planning firm. His proficiency is in civil engineering and land surveying. The Air Force veteran and Tennessee native, has lived in Collier County for more than 40 years, and once served as Assistant Collier County Engineer. It was this expertise that helped guide the new town from a farm field into a booming community.

"In my primary business, I was a stockholder and principal in a firm that did a lot of land developing," Peek explained. "I was familiar with the project that Ave Maria was becoming. I retired from that primary business when they were forming Ave Maria. The person that was trying to recruit people to be on the board knew me, so that is how my name came up, and they asked me if I was willing to be part of the board of supervisors. I knew something about the big picture of Ave Maria even though it had not started construction. I just thought it would be an interesting and enjoyable opportunity to see a new community grow up from just a farm field. It has turned out to be much more than anticipated."

For the two decades of guiding the community, officials wanted something special for Peek.

"Tom has had a long and storied career here in Southwest Florida," said Blake Gable, CEO of Barron Collier Companies. "He is a man of tremendous integrity. He is just a wonderful person. He has dedicated a lot of time as the town has grown from very few people to 15,000 people, and he has been there every step of the way and he has always conducted himself with integrity, and I can't think of anyone else who deserves it more than Tom."

Blake said this is the first time in 25 years that he has seen a street named after someone who served the community.

'We used to name towns after people," Blake said. "We thought this was a wonderful way to honor a man who has given so much to that community." David Genson, the developer's representative to the board in Ave Maria, announced the road naming during Peek's last meeting in November.
